has been printed in hundreds of publications around the world, including Outdoor Photographer, Ranger Rick, Insight travel guides and the Singapore Times. Many of his images have been used in magazines, books, calendars,

posters, cards and advertising. He has been represented by three stock photography agencies in London, Tokyo and New York. Jon lived outside the United States for nine years on three different continents and continues to travel, photographing in more than 40 countries. He has been

photographing the Colorado Plateau since 1975 and never tires of its

beauty, both subtle and spectacular.

Jon and his wife, Paula, have lived in Moab for the past 20 years. He was a founding partner in the Moab Paper

Company, producing fine art ink jet papers for artists and photographers. He currently operates Moab Photo Tours, LLC and conducts private custom photography tours and photography workshops both in the Moab area, southeastern Utah and overseas.


sprung out of these traditions. At the Bar M Chuckwagon you can leave your cares behind, go back in time and re-live the days of the American Cowboy!







How To Get A Drink...

...In Moab, Utah

Recent changes to Utah Liquor Laws have made it less confusing and easier to get an alcoholic drink. You can now go to **some** restaurants and without ordering food, you can order a drink.

Some restrictions may still apply as to where you can sit in a particular establishment when consuming alcohol. For example, Zax has an adult atmosphere in the Watering Hole where you can order a cocktail and watch your favorite sporting event on their 13 tvs, with or without ordering food. This locally owned full-service restaurant serves their entire menu in both the Watering Hole and restaurant. However, if you sit in the family dining

restaurant, you need to order food to consume an alcoholic beverage.

The Moab Brewery, Moab's only on-site microbrewery, offers a variety of locally brewed beers in their bar, as well as being available at other restaurants in town. Many flavors are on sale at retail stores

Also new is the addition of two upscale lounges in Moab. Vista Lounge located inside Buck's Grill House and

in Moab as well in the Salt Lake City area.

The Ghost Bar, upstairs at Jeffrey's Steakhouse. Both locations have a sophisticated and casual atmosphere to relax and wait for dinner or to just stop in at the end of the day and have a drink to unwind.

Moab has two local wineries. Castle Creek Winery is located at Red Cliffs Lodge, 15 miles from Moab on Scenic Highway 128 (The River Road). Spanish Valley Vineyards is located just off Highway 191, south of Moab about 6 miles on Zimmerman Lane. Both wineries have on-site tasting rooms and wine available for sale. Utah State


Liquor Stores also sell many local wines. If you would like to try some of these award winning vintages, look for restaurants serving these Moab wines.

The Utah State Liquor Store is the only location where you can purchase bottled liquor, wine and beer with an alcoholic content above 3.2%. The Moab store is located at 55 West 200 South and is open from Monday through

Saturday (11:00 am to 9:00 pm - May 1st to November 1st and from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m - November 1st to May 1st). They are closed on Sundays and Holidays.

Beer (3.2% alcohol content) for take-out can be purchased at food stores and convenience stores for off-premise consumption only. On-premise beer (you can drink it here) is available at various licensed locations, including taverns, golf courses, bowling alleys, and restaurants that have the required beer license.

Utah law forbids open containers in or about any motor vehicle. A blood alcohol level of 0.08% (0.05% if you have a child in the car with you) is the maximum allowable under Utah Code to be declared "driving under the influence."

Identify these planets and bright stars: locate the Big Dipper (Ursa Major) overhead. Trace an arc SE through its handle to Arcturus (Bootes). Continue the arc to Saturn situated above Spica (both in Virgo). Trace a wide arc NW from Spica to Mars then Regulus (both in Leo) and west to the little dog star, Procyon (below Pollux and Castor, the Gemini twins). Swing upward to Venus and curve back to Capella (Auriga). By month's end, Venus and Capella drop below the western horizon and Vega (Lyra) and Deneb (Cygnus) rise in the east.

DAYLENGTH

May provides 51 minutes of additional daylight for daytime activities. Later in the month the lingering twilight of summer becomes noticeable. As the earth moves towards the far end of its elliptical orbit, it's northern hemisphere tilts towards the face of the sun. The light rays of the rising and setting sun bend around the horizon due to refraction. With a smaller circumference presented to the sun, the light reaches farther beyond the horizon. The result is that the length of twilight is extended from one and onehalf hours to nearly two hours each morning and evening. Twilight occurs in three stages. After sunset, civil twilight provides adequate light for most detailed work for about 30 minutes. Nautical twilight marks the next 30-40 minute period when color and detail disappear in the surrounding landscape and overhead skies darken. The final period of twilight-astronomical twilight-continues an additional 30-40 minutes during which light fades from the horizon. The reverse progression takes place before sunrise.

MOON HAPPENINGS

- May 5 Full Moon occurs at 9:35pm and rises at 8:11pm.
- May 12 Last Quarter Moon rises several hours after midnight.
- May 20 New Moon occurs at 5:47pm.
- May 28 First Quarter Moon sets soon after midnight.

(The time of moonrise and moonset assumes a flat horizon. Actual time may vary.)

The Eta Aquarids—May 1-12—compete with a full moon this year. The radiant for this meteor shower emanates from Aquarius which begins to rise after midnight. Best viewing is May 4-7 after 4:00am when the meteors are active in the southeastern sky and the moon is low in the western sky. Expect about 10 meteors per hour. Other meteor activity may be visible in the early morning sky east of Bootes and in the southern sky between Scorpius and Libra.

ANNULAR SOLAR ECLIPSE

Solar eclipses occur during a new moon when the earth, moon, and sun pass one another on the same plane. This allows the moon to cross the face of the sun as seen from earth. An annular solar eclipse happens when the distance between sun and moon is too great for the moon to block the entire disk of the sun. Viewers in the center of the eclipse path (which includes southwestern Utah) see a thin ring of light encircling the darkened center of the sun. Viewers from Moab will see a partial annular eclipse. From here the sun will look like a huge crescent moon. The eclipse begins at 6:22pm and ends at sunset (8:28pm). Maximum eclipse occurs at 7:32pm.

Salt Lake City's Clark Planetarium provides maps of the eclipse path through Utah and safe viewing methods (including construction of a pinhole projector) on their website at: http://clarkplanetarium.org. They warn that viewing an annular solar eclipse without proper eye protection can permanently damage your vision. Only—AND I STRESS ONLY—Grade 14 welder goggles designed specifically for arc welding or specially-designed eclipse shades are safe. Viewing aids to AVOID are: polarized sunglasses, doubled-up sunglasses, smoked glass, and exposed camera film. See their website for further details.

Note: Hold your hand at arm's length to measure apparent distances in the sky. The width of the little finger approximates 1.5 degrees. Middle, ring, and little finger touching represent about 5 degrees. The width of a fist is about 10 degrees. The fist with the thumb extended at a right angle equals 15 degrees. The hand stretched from thumb to little finger approximates 20-25 degrees. The diameter of both the full moon and the sun spans only 0.5 degree. Adjust for the size of your hand.

VISIBLE PLANETS


Mars - Find Mars in the western sky in Leo. Differentiate it from 1st magnitude Regulus (Leo) by its reddish tint. (Magnitude +1.0)


Saturn - Look for Saturn high in the southeastern sky in Virgo. It shines with a yellow light compared to bluishwhite Spica (Virgo). (Magnitude +0.3)

Venus - Watch Venus's descent towards the western horizon each evening. It disappears from view by month's end as it begins its pass between Earth and sun. With binoculars, it appears as a thin crescent. (Magnitude -4.5)

Note: Apparent magnitude values range from -4 to +6 for most planets and visible stars. The lower the value the brighter the object. A decrease of 1.0 magnitude is 2.5 times brighter.

U.S. 191, Moab to State Route 279 **Court House Wash Bridge Widening**

Crews will begin the final microsurfacing of U.S. 191 from Cermak Street to Potash Road the beginning of May. Crews will be adding a "micro-seal" to the asphalt, which will protect it from weather and extend the life of the road. The micro-seal needs two hours to set before cars can drive on it. In an attempt to cause the least possible disruption to businesses along the construction corridor, this work will take place at night. The operation is quiet, free of vibrations and back up alarms. **There will be one-way traffic controlled** by flaggers at various locations. Please be patient as there will be delays due to the construction.

Project Update - Roadway widening north of the Colorado River Bridge and building of bicycle trails has been taking place through the winter and will be complete by June. Work other than the microsurfacing will be done during daytime hours with minimal impact to the public.

Your patience and cooperation during the construction period will be greatly appreciated and expedite project completion.



Feminine Symbolism in Moab's Basketmaker Rock Art

of Mother's Day, I will be presenting a free lecture and slideshow at Star Hall titled "Mother Earth:

almost twenty years and, while feminine symbolism is relatively rare, the places where it does exist are interesting and compelling. Some of the topics I will address include gender-specific petroglyphs look like, where they appear, how they relate to nearby art, how their meaning is connected to the topography of the surrounding area, and what they tell us about the daily lives, metaphysics, and cosmology of their creators. I will discuss several locations, but will be focusing especially Mill Creek and Kane Creek, the site of the well-known Birthing Rock panel.

There are hundreds of petroglyph panels and

On Wednesday, May 9th, at 7:30 p.m., in honor thousands of petroglyphs within ten miles of Moab. Most were created by the Basketmaker people, who lived in the area between 500 B.C. and 1,000 Feminine Symbolism in Moab's Basketmaker A.D., hundreds of years before the appearance of Rock Art." I have been studying Moab rock art for the better-known Anasazi and Fremont cultures.

Most Basketmaker rock art concerns male-dominated activities like hunting Feminine and fighting. symbolism, where occurs, includes themes like courtship, fertility, cultural roles such as child rearing and labor, and the mystical relationship between Women and the Mother Earth.

As a Mother's Day gift for all of Moab's Mamas, a free pdf download of the slideshow will be available at the lecture. Bring a flash drive or an empty disc if you want a copy. In case you can't make it to the talk, the download will also be available at the Grand County Library starting Thursday, May 10. The download will give you the keys you need to explore, enjoy, and ponder these ancient symbols, their settings and meanings, at your leisure.

Through my studies of Moab's rock art, I have sought to uncover some of the mysteries associated with Moab's ancient inhabitants. Still, nobody owns the past. Rock art was created by people for people. It is in this spirit of the Ancients that hope to share what I (may) have learned with you. See you there!

NATURE HAPPENINGS

May Flowers

The stream of wildflowers that started in February turns into a floral river in May. Though some of those early season flowers are still blooming, one doesn't have to look

so hard to find plants in flower this month.



Many shrubs such as blackbrush, cliffrose, Woods' rose, Fendlerbush, narrowleaf yucca, Spanish bayonet, and a host of others produce colorful and fragrant flowers. Both blackbrush and cliffrose, members of the Rose family, may be cloaked with yellow and cream colored blossoms, respectively. The widely distributed blackbrush has small, narrow leaves and sharp pointed twigs that try to deter herbivores. Cliffrose, with its sweet-scented blooms, may be located by smell prior to sight. The fragrant flowers produce a heavy perfume that attracts numerous bees to the flowers. The 5-lobed, small leaves are covered with small glandular hairs.

Woods' rose and Fendlerbush are two flowering shrubs that stand out against a sandstone backdrop. With pinkish flowers, the wild growing Woods' rose grows in moist areas along creeks and canyon bottoms. In contrast, Fendlerbush grows on rocky slopes and may produce a dazzling display of 4-petaled white flowers. The plant honors Augustus Wilhelm (1813-1883) who collected plants in the American Southwest.


Narrowleaf yucca and Spanish bayonet, also known as datil yucca, are two members of the Agave family that bloom in May. Yuccas have stout, sharp-pointed leaves and creamy-white flowers. The narrowleaf yucca produces an elongated flowering stalk, whereas the datil yucca's flowers open either surrounded by or barely above the long

> leaves. Both plants are pollinated by specific moths which lay their eggs in the flower's ovary just after the

moths deposit pollen on the flower's stigma. The moth larvae feed on upon late winter and early spring moisture for seed germination. If conditions are not adequate, the seeds will lie dormant for another season.

Broadleaf and milkweeds are two members of the Milkweed family that bloom in May.

Both are upright

Though the wildflowers and shrubs attract enough attention, blooming cacti seem to stop folks in their tracks. Perhaps it is the uniqueness of

the cacti plants themselves, where without leaves the green stems carry on photosynthesis in a manner different than other plants. The two barrelshaped cacti, the hedgehog and Whipple's fishhook, red and pinkishpurple flowers,

respectively. But the real show stoppers are the yellow or reddish blooms of the prickly pear cacti that seem to explode off of the plants, turning the springtime river of flowers into a raging torrent.

A Two Trail Walk - Jackson's and Rockstacker

This is the tale of two distinctive trails - Jackson's, an old-timers trail, and Rockstacker, a brand new ultra technical mountain biking trail. One hundred years have gone by since the Jackson's Trail was created - a grandfather compared to the recent birth of the Rockstacker Trail.



My story starts with the Jackson's Trail, a hard-breathing two mile ascent that provides access to the Rockstacker Trail.

John Jackson, a rancher with a feisty personality, was searching in the early 1900's for a

short cut to move his horses from the Shafer Basin country to Moab. During his search, he chose and established a route that followed the Jackson's Trail for two miles to the Amasa Back - a three-mile, cliff-sided ridge that forms a gooseneck hundreds of feet above the Colorado River. This


prominent and well-known landmark is named after George Amasa Larsen, a cattleman who arrived in Spanish Valley in the 1870's.

Quickly dropping off the Amasa Back, Jackson then guided his horses down the abrupt switchbacks of Jackson's Ladder (also known as Jacob's Ladder) – an ancient Native American trail that follows a jagged crack along a 400 foot cliff. Hopefully,

when the dramatic descent ended, all his equines arrived intact at Jackson's Hole, an abandoned bend of the Colorado River referred to as a "rincon."

To get to the trailhead from the center of town, go south on Main Street and turn right at McDonald's on to Kane Creek Blvd. Then drive approximately five miles. When the pavement changes to dirt, turn in at the second parking area, where the Jackson's Trail starts immediately to the left of the bulletin board.

The first segment of the trail is a more recent and very welcome addition that winds around Kane Creek to access an easier crossing. At the antiquities sign, however,



be sure to swing right
- the left spur deadends in a thicket of
tamarisk! Keep in mind
that during high water,

usually May and June, the river backs up into the creek and may be impassable.

Following Kane Creek to its confluence with the Colorado River, the pathway wanders through a riparian zone of tamarisk, willow and huge cottonwood trees. Edged by sagebrush, saltbush, rabbitbrush and greasewood, this shaded area attracts a variety of birds.

After leaving the wet zone, the trail quickly starts its north-facing climb through the exposed layers of Kayenta Sandstone as it travels along a distinctive westward contour above the Colorado River. Steadily moving upward, I am constantly rewarded with the expansive views of the river and the imposing cliffs of Wingate and Navajo Sandstone, which thrust up from the shores of the meandering waterway. With the steady gain in elevation, the angle and perception of the Poison Spider mesa, Behind The Rocks and the Moab Rim constantly changes - an already stunning canvas that is enhanced by the cooling vision of the La Sal Mountains on the southeastern horizon.

The Jackson's Trail merges with the Amasa Back Trail – a popular jeep and mountain biking route that follows the wide switchbacks of an old uranium exploration road. Just below that union, a map marks the route for two trails - Rockstacker and Pothole Arch. Rockstacker comes first, and after 1.6 miles it connects with the Pothole Arch Trail.

Now I am walking on the so-called "Red Line Trail"

and before long I'm following the red lines painted over large sections of slickrock. I, however, learned the hard way that paying strict attention to those faded red lines, which are sometimes hard to see, is a good idea!

The Rockstacker, with its unending views of the river, runs directly below the ridgeline of the Amasa Back. Its gentle beginnings, however, are deceiving as to the extremely rugged ledgy terrain that awaits ahead - a sharply undulating rocky path that amazingly gains very

little elevation. This challenging course involves incredible leaps that mountain bikers must negotiate to make a safe landing!

As I progress along, an appealing indentation within a small cliff beckons

me to pause in its protective shade. Shortly after that, the trail takes a circuitous route above a large rock amphitheater, which has the striking effect of looking down into a gigantic gray bowl. Then I'm climbing steeply along big looping switchbacks from one level to another that involves some exceedingly steep grades. The final stretch is a rubbly scramble to the top of

the Amasa Back mesa where the Rockstacker Trail finally joins the Pothole Arch Trail.

During my entire invigorating walk, I have enjoyed immensely the spring season of wildflowers – the tiny yellow blooms of the

Newberry's twinpod, the exquisite white flowers of the fendlerbush and the daisy-like naked stem bahia. Even with so little moisture this year, they tenaciously grow with enough energy left over to produce flowers. I have also been enchanted with the delightful chorus of birds that reverberates through the dry desert air - the ringing trills of the rock wren, the musical warble of the house finch and the performance of a spotted towhee with his invitation to

"Drink Your Tea."
On this particularly warm day, a refreshing



and I decide this is as far as I wish to go. Stretched out on my rocky perch, I make myself comfortable for a very long break to study this extensive scene that I've been observing all along. But now I'm seeing it from the perception of a much higher elevation, and

with time to spare, I'm savoring my chance to concentrate





The canyon country around Moab offers some of the most unique and varied landscape on earth, from 13,000 foot peaks and high alpine meadows to high desert vistas above the sandstone canyons. - MOONSHADOWS IN MOAB May 5, 2012 Enjoy this fully supported 44 or 60 mile ride by the light of the (almost) full moon. As you gain 2700 feet in climbing elevation the moon has risen and illuminates the desert sagebrush casting a silvery glow throughout the vastness of Canyonlands National Park. TRAIL HAPPENINGS

Got a Horse? Try Tombstone

If you've got a horse, visit Tombstone Rock, northwest of Moab. Several great rides start at Tombstone Rock and many other great rides exist within several miles: Spring Canyon Point Overlook, Bartlett Canyon, Hidden Canyon, Tusher Canyon, Mill Canyon, Monitor & Merrimac and The Old Stage Coach ruins.

Getting to Tombstone: Take 313 West from Highway 191, the turnoff for Tombstone will be about 8.5 miles on the right at Spring Canyon Bottom Road, but the only sign there says Lone Mesa Campground. Exit 313 and follow the road 1.5 miles, turn right on Dubinky Well Road. Follow Dubinky for about 4 miles, then turn left on Spring Canyon Point Road, also known as the Secret Spire (SS) Road. Tombstone Rock is another 3 miles. No water or other amenities are available at Tombstone.

Tombstone Rock gives you the best access to Needles loop, Secret Spire, Dellenbaugh

Tunnel, Dubinky Well, and Spring Canyon Point



overlook (11 miles one way). The other routes are 3-4 hours total riding each. This area is used for the Moab Canyons Endurance Ride, to be held October 18-20 in 2012.

You can also park or camp close to 313. The Lone Mesa group campground can be reserved through the BLM in Moab.

A nice campsite also exists on a hill just before the turn onto the Dubinky Well road.

From here, you can ride the east side of Bartlett Canyon or south along some cliffs to Wipe Out Hill, which is popular with Jeeps. If you are an experienced horseperson, you can walk (recommended) or ride your horse up Wipe Out Hill and get to the backside of Merrimac Butte and continue on to either Tusher Canyon or Mill Canyon, or go east to Uranium Arch. If you ride through Tusher Canyon, you can loop back through Bartlett Canyon and return to the Lone Mesa campground. This ride will be around 20 or more miles.

Another area you can park or camp is the Mill Canyon Road/Cotter Mine Road access. Exit 191 onto Mill Canyon Road about 1 mile south of the airport, and park about 1 mile in. Mill Canyon Road gives you the easiest access to Bartlett Canyon, The Pickle, Tusher Canyon, Tusher Tunnel, Mill Canyon, and the Old Stage Halfway ruins route to Monitor & Merrimac.

Many of the trails in this area are shared with off-road vehicles, and some are just hiking and singletrack mountain bike trails. All users that we have met have showed respect for our horses, and we always exit the roads and trails to allow for safe passage of all.



My favorite trails are the canyon trails; Mill Canyon, Tusher Canyon, Old Stage Coach Halfway Canyon, Bartlett Canyon, Hidden Canyon, and the Pickle. These canyons usually have some water, but not always. If you are near Tombstone, the closest water is Bartlett. Pickle Canyon is a short but nice slot canyon, just narrow enough to be interesting and safe to ride.

It has three ledges where most riders should get off and walk their horses for safety's sake. The Pickle can be found by riding southwest from the Bartlett Wash campground along the Bartlett Road until you come to a right turn at the "Pickle" sign. After you exit Pickle Canyon, you can turn right to Hidden Canyon or left to the Bartlett Wash Road.

Signed Jeep routes in the area are 3-D, SS (Secret Spire), CG (Crystal Geyser), WO (Wipe Out Hill), and MM (Monitor & Merrimac). The road names are Spring Canyon, Spring Canyon Point, Bartlett Canyon, Dubinky Well, Mill Canyon, Cotter Mine, and Dripping Spring.

Points of interest include Dellenbaugh Tunnel, Secret

On the evening of May 20, 2012, the skies over southeast Utah will host a rare celestial occurrence: a partial solar eclipse. Arches and Canyonlands National Parks and Natural Bridges National Monument will offer special ranger-led activities to help visitors enjoy this unique experience safely.

At the Moab Farmer's Market on Saturday, May 19th, visit the NPS booth and learn how to make your own solar eclipse pinhole viewer.

On Sunday May 20th, between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m., join a ranger at one of these park locations with unobstructed views of the eclipse:

- Pothole Point, Canyonlands National Park, Needles District.
- Green River Overlook, Canyonlands National Park, Island in the Sky District, or
 - Panorama Point, Arches National Park.

In addition, Natural Bridges National Monument will offer a special ranger talk at 6 p.m. in front of the Visitor

Solar eclipse viewing with a solar scope and solar viewers will take place after the talk until dark.

Looking directly at the sun without a proper solar filter can cause damage, severe eve blindness; including sunglasses do not provide

sufficient protection. Rangers at each location will provide approved solar viewing devices and assist visitors with understanding the celestial mechanics that cause this special event.

INNOVATIVE HAPPENINGS

Robin Wilson

"We were doing eco-tours before they were called that, and before anyone else was doing it. We got press because of it." "We" were the founders of Canyonlands Field Institute, Robin Wilson and Karla VanderZanden. I was interviewing Karla at the Wake 'n' Bake in Moab as part of this series on people whose creativity, love of Moab, and willingness to sacrifice for a dream pulled Moab through the uranium bust years into the present. Robin and Karla

were part of that group.

In 1982, Karla was sitting in the student union at Utah State University (USU) with friends also destined to be part of the Moab community--Alice Drogin, Tim Graham, Audrey Graham, and Kate Kitchel. Discussing their career plans, Karla said she'd like to bring her love of river running, camping, and outdoor education together. Kate said, "You should meet Robin Wilson in Moab." Kate knew Robin had gone to H. K. Hancock at the USU extension office to discuss using their facilities for an outdoor education program. She had also considered using the Professor Valley ranch which was her and her husband Bates Wilson's home.

In May of 1983, Robin and Karla met for coffee on Robin's front porch. Watching the sun come up, they discussed their ideas for getting people into the Moab area and raising their understanding of it. Bates had died earlier that year which left Robin alone to run the ranch and raise two daughters. Karla was still a West Water River Ranger on the Colorado and going to graduate school, but by June 5, of 1984, Karla had graduated, and they incorporated as Canyonlands Field Institute (CFI).

Naming the Institute was an adventure. Robin, Karla, and Barry Miller, Karla's husband, ran West Water as a daily, but they put in at Loma, Colorado because the West Water Ranger Station was flooded out. Normally a two to three day trip, they ran from Loma to Cisco, Utah in a day. With the river running at 60,000 cubic feet per second (cfs), when normal for spring run off might be 20,000 to 35,000 cfs, they must have been busy navigating, but they still found time to come with up the name.

"CFI has always had the same goal--to establish a meaningful connection between kids and the Colorado Plateau. That includes the peoples of this area as well as the science", Karla explained. "It was important to Robin that we be gracious hosts to the people who came to the Colorado Plateau and those who lived here. We wanted to dialogue in a softer way about caring for the place and wanted to emphasize relationship. Robin had a saying, 'Any kind of footwear is welcome on this porch."

That also sounds a lot like Bates, Robin's husband and retired superintendent of Arches National Park. In Down the Colorado, Jim Carrier recorded a conversation he had with Robin. "There were a couple of years, after Bates died,

when I wondered whether I should be doing something to preserve an attitude. Bates was not a person who wrote things down. There is very little of his legacy on paper." And so she formed CFI, in part, as "a carrying on of an attitude, of wanting this country understood and enjoyed. . ." the way Bates had understood it and shared it--letting it speak for itself.

"Gracious," was the first word Alice Drogin used to

describe Robin when I asked how she remembered her. She said she also admired her intelligence and integrity and saw her as a role model. For Karla, she was a life, as well as career mentor. "She could be direct in that capacity, trying to smooth off some my hard edges."

Mentor, role model, business woman, outdoor educator and guide were all roles Robin filled with aplomb, but Robin was first a mother, according to Karla. "She had two teenage daughters when Bates

died, and while she donated many unpaid hours to CFI, the girls came first."

Robin's idea of a nightly, multi-projector, slide show featuring the canyon country came together with the production of The Canyon's Edge. It was written and narrated by Terry Tempest Williams, the photos were by Tom Till and Bruce Hucko who also programmed it. Originally, it required eight slide projectors, and was shown in the big barn that has since become Eddie McStiff's. Christy Williams, now program director for KZMU and others, took the unwieldy show on the road to communities of Eastern Utah and the Western Slope of Colorado.

Early on, CFI presented programs for adults as well as children and were very successful at it. They offered classes with credit from USU taught by such local experts

as Tom Till and Steve Mulligan--photography, wild flower identification--Lee Goodman and desert ecology--Tim Graham.

Robin died May 3, 1991 of cancer at the age of 56.

Her death was a blow to the organization and to all who knew her. Still, CFI survived, and today is a healthy non-profit carrying on in her spirit of letting people discover the desert and helping them appreciate what they find.

Remembering Robin Wilson nearly thirty years after their initial meeting, Christy Williams recalls, "Robin was one of the first people I met on moving to Moab, so I associated her with the place. She was a good person to imprint on since, like Moab, she embodied spaciousness, gravity [as in grounded] and peace. Everything good you could say

about wild places, you would get in a micro dose being in Robin's company."

Sue Bellagamba also recalls how everyone-neighboring ranchers, east coast visitors and young idealists--felt at home on the porch in Professor Valley. But it wasn't as though she spent her days sitting there, for she often had to get up and irrigate before driving the River Road into town to be at the CFI office at 8:00. Robin combined the grace and manners of her east coast upbringing and Smith College education with the roll-upyour-sleeves and don't-shy-from-the-dirty-work attitudes of the West.

Finally, I will let Robin speak for herself in this letter she wrote to Theresa King, President of the Moab Chamber of Commerce, upon being named Citizen of the Year for 1989.

January 26, 1990

Dear Theresa:

I write to you as spokeslady for the Chamber, but with those in mind who had to deal with the fine roster of nominations for the Citizen of the Year Award.

First, my very sincere thanks for this honor. It is still an overwhelming thought for me. It is an incentive. It is a statement of caring and trust. In that light, it is humbling.


Secondly, it says to me something about the values and privileges of life in a small town. In larger places, you lose the connectedness of lives. Here, we are all woven together in many ways. It is the way life is

Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation

The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation is a non-profit organization dedicated to the mission of ensuring the future of elk, other wildlife and their habitat. The Canyonlands

Chapter of the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation was established twenty-two years ago, just six years after the national chapter was established in Missoula, Montana. Since that time, the Canyonlands Chapter has spent countless hours and raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to aid in the mission of the organization.

To date, the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation has protected and enhanced over 6 million acres, supported over 7,400

projects and has restored long-absent elk populations to states throughout the east. In the state of Utah the Elk Foundation has conserved or enhanced approximately 918,000 acres and has funded over 315 projects that vary from habitat enhancement to wildlife studies. Multiple projects have been done locally in the Book Cliffs, La Sals and Elk Ridge which include noxious weed eradication, placement of guzzlers, spring enhancement and juniper thinning.

Elk are members of the cervid family along with deer, moose and caribou. There are six recognized subspecies of elk in North America (two became extinct in the late 1800s)

> with all of the elk in Utah of the subspecies known as Rocky Mountain elk. Statewide elk populations range around 68,000 and local populations hold approximately 2,300 elk in the La Sals, 4,650 in the Book Cliffs and 1,400 in the Abajos and Elk Ridge.

Elk males, females and young are known as bulls, cows and calves, respectively. Calves are born in May or June into nursery bands of gregarious

cows and calves. Within weeks the nursery bands will disperse into smaller groups across their summer range. At this same time, bulls can be found banded together in "bachelor groups". In early September the rut begins, in which bulls begin to bugle and gather cows into harems. Bulls vigorously defend their harems from other "satellite" bulls attempting to breed their cows. After the rut, bulls will return to their bachelor groups in which they will spend the remainder of the year.

Elk are a generalist ungulate (Latin word for "hoof"), and have a varied diet which consists of grasses, forbs and shrubs. This flexible diet allows elk to live in a variety of habitat types including all of Utah's mountains

as well as some of the low deserts. It is common for the elk of Utah to spend their summers at high elevations in aspen conifer forests and the winter at mid to low elevation habitats which might include mountain shrub and sagebrush communities.

Annually the Canyonlands Chapter of the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation holds their Big Game Banquet. This evening is an elaborate event in which volunteers put together an evening of auctions (live and silent) raffles and games, meant to generate funding for the mission of the foundation. This year's annual banquet will take place at the Grand Center on May 19th. 21st Century Medicine -Bandaids or True Healing?

The other day I saw an ad depicting Larry the Cable Guy trying to sell Prilosec. "Suffering from heartburn day after day is as unnecessary as wearing sleeves," he says. It might be catchy, and it obviously sells, but it makes no more sense to take a drug to cover up heartburn than it does to cover up a skin cancer with a Bandaid

Unfortunately, this has been the approach physicians have taken toward a host of health problems for over 100 years. Instead of making the effort to determine the cause of an individual's heartburn, for example, we are content to suppress it with drugs that reduce stomach acid. As long as the patient feels better now, never mind the fact that excess stomach acid may have nothing to do with the problem. Never mind, either, that long-term acid suppression has some very serious consequences. When the heartburn worsens, we increase the dose of stomach acid-reducing medicine until the maximum dosage is reached. When that no longer works, patients are offered the next drug on the list or even advised to go under the knife in the hope of fixing the problem.

By contrast, at the Grand County Wellness Center, our interest is not in merely finding the magic pill that temporarily suppresses or controls every symptom. Instead, we search for potential causes and make every effort to help patients rebalance their physiology. Our approach is straightforward. Give the body what it needs; remove what it doesn't need; treat causes, not symptoms. The body has a remarkable ability to heal itself if we give it the right fuel, remove the obstacles to health, and utilize an ever-growing array of tools to support the body's repair. The more we learn, the more we discover that nobody has all the answers and that no single treatment is the definitive answer to a given condition.

Fortunately, people are becoming increasingly aware that covering up each symptom with a drug doesn't necessarily solve their problems. As a result, they are demanding more effective, less risky (think of all the side effects and complications rattled off at the end of the commercials), and more personalized care. They even ignore national expert committee opinions and specialty society consensus guidelines that seek to reduce human beings to numbers and medical professionals to technicians in an assembly line. Fortunately too, when doctors run lab tests and say "there is nothing wrong with you, just take this pill," patients are no longer content. They keep looking.

At the Grand County Wellness Center, we do not pretend to have all the answers; but we are always learning. Thanks to weekly continuing medical education from experts across the country, we do not practice the same medicine today as we did even one month ago. And we are never satisfied to just control symptoms. If you are driving and notice your steering wheel tugging toward one side, you wouldn't just grip the steering wheel harder. Before too long, you would check your tire pressures and

then your alignment. We feel the same way about diseases that arise in the human body - It

makes much more sense to step back and take a look at what might be causing them than to merely compensate for or try to cover them up. When routine lab tests come back normal (or are simply not relevant in the first place), we are fortunate to be able to draw upon the resources of multiple specialty labs that enable us to get to the bottom of perplexing problems. A small sampling of the common problems for which we have uncommon solutions includes fatigue, depression, irritable bowel syndrome, constipation, muscle weakness, insomnia, sinus congestion, and yes, heartburn. Whether you have been dealing with issues like these

for a week or decades, you might want to schedule an appointment. Or, if you feel fine now but want to prevent diseases for which you are or think you might be at risk, you will find refreshing our focus on true disease prevention, not just early detection. Either way, join your friends and neighbors in discovering the benefits of 21stcentury medicine.



Off the Map Bridge to the Past: Part Two

Boots on, packs checked and shouldered, we stomp across slickrock and descend into White Canyon. Stepping back through a millennium of geologic time with each step, the air grows first cool then cold along the southern edge of a massive cliff face casting permanent shadow along a stretch of trail lined with a population of fir trees growing at low elevation. The sunlight had reached the tops of giant cottonwoods growing along the edge of the steam running along the canyon bottom still far below, bright yellow autumn leaves reflecting their light back up to us. We pass an ancient mud and brick granary, now reduced to rubble by blundering tourists despite a sign placed by the Park Service requesting visitors not disturb the ruin. It's in such bad shape that my client doesn't bother to photograph it. Nearby on a sandstone outcrop we find sharpening grooves

cut deeply into the rock.

today, not even footprints.

After lunch we explore further to find that the canyon ends, as so many drainages do in this country, at an impassible vertical pour-off. The sun is now well past it's half way point in the sky and we turn to retrace our route back and the long steep climb out of the canyon. Upon reaching the truck, my client offers a handshake and a heartfelt compliment. I inform him that the day is not over yet and we set off rim walking the canyon up past the bridge and back to the first big ruin complex we encountered earlier. From our high vantage point we examine the ruins that were inaccessible up on the ledge and find a massive kiva, numerous dwellings and granaries.

Usually after a long day on the trail my clients are quiet and tired on the ride back to Moab but today's ride is filled with questions about our hike and other places

Here the trail takes off steeply down hill as if impatient to reach the wash bottom nestled in the rocks below. We pass through the massive shadow of the bridge, slipping and sliding our way to the canyon bottom. My client confirms he has indeed been here before by leading me down the trail and instinctively turning left as we reach the canyon bottom, following a well worn tourist trail used to reach the remaining bridges. I stop him before he crosses the wash.

"This way." I point to a faint trace leading off from the main trail. After forty-five minutes of bush whacking, stream crossings and route finding around numerous rocky and muddy obstacles we come to a massive complex of ruins

on the north side of the canyon. The site is divided into structures along the edge of the wash and a second big group built about fifty feet up on an inaccessible ledge directly above. There are a couple of kivas - one restored, granaries, a cooking or community structure and what appears to be storage or possibly sleeping structures complete with doors built low to the ground and up against the canyon wall. We catch a tantalizing glimpse here and there of the ledge ruins above but they can only be accessed by a very long ladder.

Continuing up the wash bottom we come to a second ruin just around the next bend and the cameras come out again. Wandering another mile, another set of ruins appears including a set of double granaries and a kiva. I can tell by the smile on my client's face that he is enjoying his trek. Up canyon we go, stopping at yet another kiva site for some lunch, conversation and reflection. Sitting in the comfortably warm fall sun among the ruins and rock art seemed like a shared experience with those who came before us so many centuries in the past. We haven't seen another person so far

that were similar in nature to White Canyon. I help carry his gear up to his room and give him one of my business cards. In return he passes along the biggest tip I've ever received for a day of guiding. The satisfaction I receive from having a grateful customer far outweighs any gratuity they may offer.

Color Returns to the Trails at Dead Horse Point State Park

The month of May marks a fantastic change in the plant life at Dead Horse Point State Park. Despite

the dry winter, the plants are returning with brilliant color. This is an excellent month for photographers, artists or anyone interested in desert flowers to visit the park. The variety of colors found right at the trails' edge is enough to entice anyone to hike a bit further. The deciduous trees and shrubs of the park have awakened from their winter slumber and are bringing lush green tones and lively zest to the red rock landscape. Hikers are sure to be pleased by the

sweet fragrance drifting from flowering shrubs.

The blossoming of cacti is an event not to be missed. For a brief time of the year these spiny desert icons turn into splashes of color on the landscape. Be it a prickly pear, claret cup or fishhook, each cactus brings their own significant flower to the mix. The prickly pear, the most common cactus in the park, is known for large flowers of yellow, pink and orange. The claret cup grows in a clustered mound spotted with fiery red flowers that have

a golden base. The bright red flowers of the claret cup make the sparsely distributed cactus much easier to spot.

The least common cactus in the park is the fishhook. Unlike the claret cup, the barrel shaped fishhook usual grows individually, and is worth hiking the extra mile to spot one. The top of the cactus

cactus and wildflowers is the fragrance of the Fremont's mahonia and cliffrose. The flowers of both shrubs have a sweet smell that will usually reach a hikers' nose before the shrub catches their eye. The sweet honey like fragrance of the mahonia's golden flowers attracts bees as well as hikers. The scent of the white cliffrose flower is a favorite to many. Fortunately, these shrubs can be found on trails throughout the park and outside the visitor center.

May is an excellent time of year to visit a park. Even if you miss the blooming plants, the weather is ideal for

outdoor activities. Pack a picnic, sturdy shoes and a camera, and head up to Dead Horse Point State Park for a wonderful spring afternoon.

Dead Horse Point State Park is located nine miles north of Moab on US 191, and 23 miles south on SR 313. The visitor center is open daily from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Park admission is \$10. For more information, Please contact the park at 435-259-2614.

The first time she plunged her hands into clay, she was hooked,

from that point on every free class was spent in the art room. After high school, Leigh took off to travel the country & live the nomadic life and clay was put on hold for awhile.



STUNT STARS AND LEGENDS

Cliff Lyons



Clifford William Lyons, the oldest son of Mena and Garrett Lyons, was born July 4, 1901 in Lake County, South Dakota. He lived on a farm and attended the Clarno Rural School. He accompanied his parents to Tennessee where he attended business school in Memphis. In 1920, his parents moved back to a

farm near Agar, South Dakota. Soon after his father died in 1921, Cliff formed a rodeo troupe with friends and in 1922 he moved to California.

He began his movie career as a silent screen cowboy actor in films like "The Saddle King". He was in the original version of "Ben Hur (1927) and stunted in the original "Beau Geste" (1927). When talkies started in that year, he changed careers and became one of the first and most famous stuntmen in movie history.

In the 1930s, he was the frequent stunt double for Buck Jones, Johnny Mack Brown and Ken Maynard. He also doubled for Tom Mix in Mascot's "The Miracle Rider" (1935).

In 1948 he began a relationship with John Ford and his longtime friend John Wayne that lasted through 15 films, the first being "Fort Apache" (1948), followed by "The Wagon Master" filmed in Moab in 1950).

In 1960, he was Action Director on "The Alamo", "The Train Robbers" (1973) and more. In many of the Wayne pictures, Cliff wound up doing stunts as well as coordinating and second unit directing.

He also worked in a variety of other films such as "Ben Hur" (Charlton Heston), "They Died With Their Boots On" (Errol Flynn) and "Mighty Joe Young" (Ben Johnson). Ben was also co-starred with Harry Carey, Jr. on "The Wagon Master".

Cliff was one of the original members of the Board of Directors of the Hollywood Stuntmen's Hall of Fame. He donated many large photos of himself with such stars as Clark Gable, Spencer Tracy, and Buck Jones, as well his unique stunt bag.

Here is a letter Cliff received from John Wayne in 1955 regarding his work in "The Conqueror" which was filmed in St. George, Utah.

In 1938, 20th Century-Fox Studios starred Tyrone Power and Henry Fonda in "Jesse James". Cliff Lyons was hired to double both the actors when Frank and Jesse are riding hard to avoid capture after attempting to rob the bank in Northfield, Minnesota. The studio went to Noel, Missouri, in the extreme southwestern corner of the state. The Elk river provided a convenient Ozark stream for background visual effect, especially during chase scenes, when the drama was intensified by the splashing hooves of galloping horses.

Frank and Jesse (Fonda and Power) suddenly come to the edge of a high precipice overlooking a mountain stream. There is no alternative but to jump over the cliff with their horses. And they do. And back in 1938, when the movie was made, jumping over a cliff meant jumping over a cliff with a real horse and rider. That's where Lake of the Ozarks came in.

Actually jumping into a shallow stream from a high cliff was an impossibility. So a plunge into Elk River was out of the question. The same held true for every other Ozark cliff and river. Except at Lake of the Ozarks. In 1938

it was the only deep water lake in the region. And it had plenty of cliffs along its shoreline. So the production crew moved up here for the shoot.

They settled on a 70-foot high cliff between mile markers 21 and 22. The cameras would be angled to show the cliff and some of the lake, but the broader expanse of water would be off camera so as to give the impression that our heroes were jumping into a small river. And since there was an element of danger here, only one horse would actually go over the edge. The spliced footage from two cameras would give the impression that two riders made the jump.

No horse could be trained to make that jump, so the chosen steed was placed on a slippery platform known as a tilt chute. With stuntman Cliff Lyons in the saddle, one end of the chute was lifted and horse and rider slid over the abyss.

In the first moment of the scene all four of the horse's hooves were together as it tried to prevent the slide. Once in the air, the animal flailed wildly and instantly turned over.

Lyons was okay as a rescue boat fished him out of the water. And the horse, too, had survived the fall. But once in the water the now panicked animal thrashed about uncontrollably, and before the rescuers could get a rope on the terrified horse, it had drowned.

The spectacular cliff jump scene was included in the final cut of the film. But public outcry over the death of the horse raised a furor in Hollywood. As a result, the Motion Picture Association of America granted the American Humane Association the rights to monitor the treatment of animals in all future stunts.

So today, when you read in the end credits that "no animals were harmed in the making of this motion picture," know that it all dates back to a regrettable incident at Lake of the Ozarks.

Training a Dachshund and Other Seemingly Impossible Tasks

Part 4: Bubble aka Princess Bubble & Squeak

This is a continuation of the series about our own pets and what we have learned about them, living with them. The cats have had their turn so now it is the dog's turn. When we were ready to have dogs we thought that it would be easier to have smaller dogs. We got two female Dachshund puppies from the same litter and brought them home with us, their names are Saffron and Bubble.

This article is about Bubble, also known as Princess Bubble and Squeak (her AKC name) and Bubby. Bubble is a four year old female Dachshund with a dapple coat. She is a sweet dog who wants to be with you all the time, can not hold her licker and is a chow hound with some issues when it comes to food, both from an intolerance and aggression standpoint. Bubble is the typical shaped Dachshund, she is long and lean with very short legs and therefore is very prone to back issues and has issues getting up on or down from furniture.

The Dachshund may look funny, like a barking sausage on legs, but they are a very proud and clever dog that needs special training to become an obedient one. Many owners say that their Dachshunds are impossible to train as they are fiercely independent dogs — and they are somewhat right. Training a Dachshund is not about making them learn commands but rather about convincing them that cooperating with you may be beneficial. Bubble will almost always make sure that she gets a "fair price" for her work or attention if she is doing something that is undesirable and we need it to stop.

Bubble took eight months to potty train, and even then we can still have relapses. We started out using potty pads and I truly believe that in this case, with this dog, it was the worst method we could have chosen. She used the potty pads well for a while but when we would take her outside to go, she wouldn't. When the potty pads were taken away she would go back to the spot they were in and go on the carpet. The solution that worked best was crate training. For her it was a matter of every time she was let out of the crate she would be taken outside, regardless of whether she was in there for one hour or longer. She also was taken out after each meal and big drink of water. Staying consistent with this taught her that the only appropriate place to potty was outside and it was always compensated with a high reward treat.

Many dogs have allergies or intolerances to certain ingredients in dog food, even the really good dog food. Bubble is intolerant to beef; she has been fed a fresh frozen diet since she was a puppy but whenever beef has been put on the menu she vomits it back up almost immediately. Stella and Chewys frozen diets have many options outside of beef for her to eat so she gets to eat a range of proteins and have variety in her diet. Because she is a fed raw diet she only has to eat 3 ounces of raw meat once a day. When you feed your dog a raw diet they only eat up to 2% of their ideal body weight in raw food a day and as it takes their stomach up to 24 hours to properly process a meal we only feed her in the morning. Keep in mind that the portion size of the meal only applies when you are feeding a pre-prepared and balanced raw diet that contains the correct balance of muscle meat, organ meat, bone, fat and vegetables not if you are feeding meat from the grocery

Bubble has other issues with food, mainly possessiveness that turns into aggression. Buster (cat) cannot be around when she is being fed or she will try and get in his face and growl. Unfortunately he is not the brightest and neither gets the message or learns from his mistakes and often gets chased away or sometimes snapped at. Dachshunds are notoriously possessive and jealous creatures and it was easiest for all involved to set up meal time procedures to avoid this happening, rather than trying to manage the behavior when it happens. What we did

was make sure that Buster and Chicken (other cat) get fed first and then the dog's get fed while he is in another room eating so he does not get in the way, if he does one person manages him while the other feeds the dogs.



Bubby also likes to eat gross things; unfortunately this is the reality of living with a Dachshund, as they are like the toddler that puts everything in their mouth. It is important to pay attention to them whilst outside as they are quite likely to get into something that is highly inappropriate. Sometimes it works in my favor as she will quite often accept vegetables as a treat, she especially loves the stalks of asparagus and so I can always give her a low calorie and healthy treat as a reward without making her fat, which is also common problem with Dachshunds.

The reason you want a lean wiener is because they have a strong propensity towards a condition called IVDD, in fact 1 in 5 Dachshunds can be affected by the disease. The dog's spine consists of vertebrae, which are connected by flexible cartilage discs. These discs called "intervertebral discs" are cushions between each vertebra (bone) and allow for movement of the neck, spine, and tail. These discs may become weak and can rupture or herniate. This can cause the disc to protrude, a very painful condition for the dog. In keeping Bubble lean and not allowing her to jump up or down off of things we can try and ensure that she will not injure her back.



Living with a Dachshund is a really unique experience. They are can be entertaining and irritating all at the same time, but at the end of a long day their favorite place to be is right next to you on the couch or if allowed under the covers of your bed. If you regard them as the fierce warrior they are rather than a clownish sausage on legs, life will be much easier and more rewarding than you can imagine.
