



WINTER RECREATION HAPPENINGS

Winter in the La Sal Mountains

When the weather in Moab gets cold, freezing the Colorado River and putting snow and ice on everybody's favorite bike trail or climbing route, there is another alternative available. Find yourself in an inversion? It is time to go and discover the recreation opportunities in the La Sal Mountains.

The La Sals are second only to the Uintas as the highest peaks in the state of Utah. These mountains soar to almost 13,000 feet above sea level and over 8,000 feet above the valley floor. A laccolith process formed the La Sals. With this process, a mass of igneous rock intruded between layers of sedimentary rock, resulting in uplift. You could call them frustrated volcanoes too. Aside from the volcanoes of the Pacific-Northwest, there are no peaks with greater rise in the continental U.S.

Winter recreation in the La Sals includes cross country skiing, skate skiing, snowshoeing, sledding, back-country skiing and snowmobiling. The winter access to the mountains is provided from two routes kept open by the Grand and San Juan County Road Departments.



1. The La Sal Mountain Loop Road is plowed regularly. The Geyser Pass road is kept open to the restrooms and parking area at 9,600'. The Geyser Pass Road and Gold Basin Road beyond the winter trailhead is a popular area for cross country skiing, snowshoeing and snowmobiling. Groomed trails are provided by the Lower Utah Nordic Alliance (LUNA). Volunteers groom trails approximately twice a week, which provide 12 kilometers of a groomed trail-system, open to every winter user group. These roads also provide access to backcountry skiing and snowboarding in the Mt. Tomasaki and Gold Basin areas. There is a sledding hill just below the parking lot. If you are using the sledding hill, please park in the parking lot so other vehicles can get to the parking lot. The road in the winter is narrow enough!

Snowmobiles are not allowed to leave the road in Gold Basin. Please respect this closure of the most popular skiing area in the La Sals - the rest of the entire range is open to you! 2. From near Old La Sal at the south end of the range, the road is plowed regularly two miles short of Dark Canyon Lake, just below Mount Peale. The San Juan Road Department makes a parking lot at about 9,600'.

These simple cabins are great for folks who want to spend several days in the mountains, but don't want to lose a couple of hours driving back and forth from town every day. The hut operators can snow cat your supplies and camping gear in for you saving you the heavy carry.





Avalanche Hazard in the La Sal **Mountains**


The La Sals are rubbly piles of fractured stone. The angle of repose for this broken stone is 38 degrees, and since snow is also a granular substance, 38 degrees is the bulls-eye slope angle for snow avalanches. Keep in mind though, that avalanches run on terrain from 30 - 45 degrees. Most people caught in avalanches are in terrain that is 30 - 35 degrees of steepness. The La Sal Mountains usually possess one of the weakest snow packs imaginable.

Why do we care? Because 30% of people completely buried by avalanches are killed by trauma and many of those remaining die from suffocation. These are not good odds. It's not good policy to plan on outrunning an avalanche, even on a fast snowmobile, because avalanches have been clocked at well over 200 mph. Grim statistics showing that snowmobilers are the most likely people to be killed in avalanches also support this.

So what do we do? Fortunately, staying safe doesn't have to mean staying at home! The good news is that most people trigger the slide that catches them, so if we learn a little about snow and adjust our behavior to suit the conditions, we can continue to enjoy our

winter playground!

The Manti-La Sal Avalanche Center in Moab exists to help you make the right decisions. The MLSAC Forecasters examine the snow and produce an advisory informing you of where you are most likely to run into problems and just how sensitive the snow is. They also produce a mountain weather forecast, work with the Moab Winter Search and Rescue Team and provide avalanche education to the community in numerous ways. The MLSAC educates the community through the advisories, classes held periodically, radio announcements on the weekends on KZMU, the website and at the Geyser Pass Trailhead information board.



Non-Profit Dance Band to Partner with Wabi-Sabi

The Moab Community Dance Band has been putting on a contra dance almost monthly for the past 5 years. Dancers are encouraged to donate \$5.00 per person to benefit a selected beneficiary. Over the years MCDB has given a total of approximately \$2600 to many of our local organizations such as the Humane Society, the Recycling Center, Club Red, the Christmas House Box, Moab Music Festival Educational Outreach, and the Moab Valley Multicultural Center to mention a few.

What is a contra dance you ask? The dance has its origins from the "Old Country." Dances are done in long lines dancing with a partner and a set of neighbors. Many of the moves are similar to the moves done in a square dance. At the end of a dance you will have danced with everyone in the line. A well-known caller among Contra Dancers, Tony Parkes, says, "Contra dancing is an enjoyable social activity that almost anyone can join in. It can serve as an icebreaker, an exercise medium, and a means of building community spirit. All dances are taught and called, which means no experience is necessary, nor do you need to come with a partner. We would love to hold a dance for your organization. Ideally, we ask that someone in your organization attend the dance to collect money and to give a plug for your cause. In addition, we ask that you advertise the dance within your organization in order to bring in more people. More people



Counting Birds for Christmas

One hundred and eleven years ago, Frank Chapman gave a huge Christmas gift, "For the birds." How true that was

In 1900, Chapman and the fledgling National Audubon Society decided to organize an alternative Christmas Day activity that focused on observing birds, not shooting them. Tradition "Side Hunts" involved teams bagging game and birds; the biggest pile of fur and feathers won. This wanton destruction of wildlife bothered Chapman and others, so they hatched a conservation alternative.

That first year, 27 people participated in 25 counts across the country. They recorded ninety species during that first "Christmas Bird Census." Today, the census has molted into the "Christmas Bird Count" or "CBC," and is held between mid-December and early January. Over 50,000 people will participate in this longest-running citizen science project in the United States. This year marks the count's 111th anniversary.

Since 1900, counts have sprouted across the United States and other countries. From Coos Bay, Oregon to Cocoa Beach, Florida birders flock to their local CBC. For the 108th CBC, there were over 2000 counts and over 60,000 participants in over 25 countries. The newest continent to host a CBC was Antarctica on Christmas Day 2008. Although they had only 3 participants and recorded just 5 species, they tallied over 270 thousand Adelie penguins.

Although the Moab count will not have penguins, it

does have some coveted species like peregrine falcons, merlins, Harris' sparrows, northern pygmy owls, evening grosbeaks, brown creepers, Lincoln sparrows, great-tailed grackles, and others. "Highlights were eighteen wood ducks, three hooded mergansers, two merlins, one great horned owl, and others," said compiler Marcy Hafner about the 2009 count. "We also had 47 participants and counted 72 species."



Generally, the Moab count gets between 65 and 75 species. Numerous factors including weather and coverage affect this total. Though some count days are sunny and cool, I remember one count trudging through a foot of snow in the Matheson Wetlands Preserve.


Hosted by the Moab Bird Club, the CBC is open to all interested parties. Some folks participate by watching their feeders and recording species observed throughout the day. Others join teams that explore assigned areas within the count circle. Fifteen miles in diameter, this circle encompasses the Moab Valley, Matheson Wetlands Preserve, the Colorado River Corridor, Castle Valley, and Sand Flats Recreational Area. Teams drive, hike, bike, float, or sit and record the birds.


> Common backyard birds like northern flickers, house finches, house sparrows, dark-eyed juncos, and white-crowned sparrows are usually well represented in neighborhoods.

> What the CBC provides is a snapshot of winter birds. Although there is an "expected" assortment of species each winter, because of weather conditions or storms, birders might find some

unusual species like gray-crowned rosy finches or red crossbills. These birds are not "expected," but locating them is a true Christmas gift.

Moab's CBC will take place on Saturday, December 18. A potluck brunch will follow on Sunday, December 19, starting at 10 a.m. at The Nature Conservancy



How To Get A Drink...

...In Moab, Utah

Recent changes to Utah Liquor Laws have made it less confusing and easier to get an alcoholic drink. Private Clubs are a thing of the past. You can now go to a restaurant or a tavern (and without ordering food or buying a club membership) and order an drink.

Some restrictions may still apply as to where you can sit in a particular establishment when consuming alcohol. For example, Zax has an adult atmosphere in the Watering Hole where you can order a cocktail and watch your favorite sporting event on their 13 tvs, with or without ordering food. This locally

owned full-service restaurant serves their entire menu in both the Watering Hole and restaurant. However, if you sit in the family dining restaurant,

you need to order food to consume an alcoholic beverage.

Moab has two local wineries and two microbreweries. Eddie McStiff's Restaurant & Brew Pub, is Moab's Oldest and Original Brewery. They have 12 beers on tap and a hassle free bar where you can get a glass of wine or a cocktail or beer without ordering food or joining a club.

The Moab Brewery, Moab's only on-site microbrewery, offers a variety of locally brewed beers in their tavern, as well as being available at other restaurants in town. Many flavors are on sale at retail stores in Moab as well in the Salt Lake City area.

Castle Creek Winery is located at Red Cliffs Lodge, 15 miles from Moab on Scenic Highway 128 (The River Road). Spanish Valley Vineyards is located just off Highway 191, south of Moab about 6 miles on Zimmerman Lane. Both wineries have on-site tasting rooms and wine available for sale. Utah State Liquor Stores also sell many local wines. If you would like to try some of these award winning vintages, look for restaurants serving these Moab wines.

If you enjoy any of these locally produced products, be sure to ask for a list of locations where you may purchase them when you return home.

Also new this year, two lounges have emerged. Vista Lounge at Buck's Grill and the Ghost Bar at Jeffrey's Steakhouse. Both locations have an upscale casual atmosphere to relax and wait for dinner or to just stop in at the end of the day and have a drink to unwind.

The Utah State Liquor Store is the only location where y o u c a n purchase bottled liquor, wine and beer with an

alcoholic content above 3.2%. The Moab store is located at 55 West 200 South and is open from Monday through Saturday

(11:00 am to 9:00 pm -May 1st to November 1st and from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m -November 1st to May 1st). They are closed on Sundays and Holidays.

Beer (3.2% alcohol content) for take-out can be purchased at food stores and convenience stores for off-premise consumption only. On-premise beer (you can drink it here) is available

at various licensed locations, including taverns, golf courses, bowling alleys, and restaurants that have the required beer license.

Utah law forbids open containers in or about any motor vehicle. A blood alcohol level of 0.08% (0.05% if you have a child in the car with you) is the maximum allowable under Utah Code to be declared "driving under the influence."

HIKING HAPPENINGS

Jacob's Ladder - A Step Back In History

The term "Jacob's Ladder" suggests a title for a biblical story, not a trail that clings precariously to a break in the side of a 400-foot cliff. Accented with abrupt switchbacks, it is also commonly known as "Jackson's Ladder" — a more appropriate name since John Jackson, a forceful rancher,

established this steep, ladder-like trail as a short cut from the Shafer Basin country to Moab in the early 1900's.

Old timers remember this trail being used mainly for horses. The large herds of free-ranging cattle, which Jackson owned, were instead moved into the Shafer Basin by swimming the bovines across the Colorado River. This turned out to be a risky maneuver and tragedy struck in March 1913 when Walter L. Clark, an employee of Jackson's, drowned while trying to retrieve a boat that was being used to herd

Jacob's Ladder can be accessed either by the Amasa Back Trail or the Jackson's Trail. I prefer the less crowded non-motorized Jackson's Trail, which angles up the cliff on the north-facing side of the Colorado. Consequently, during the fall and winter it stays in the shade most of the day.

the cattle to the other side.

To get to that trailhead, go south on Main Street and turn right at McDonald's on to Kane Creek Blvd. Then drive approximately five miles. Just past the cattleguard, where the pavement turns to dirt, there are two parking areas. Turn in at the second parking area. The trail, which is two miles in length, starts immediately to the left of the bulletin board.

The first segment on the trail is a more recent and very welcome

addition that provides an easier crossing over Kane Creek. During high water, however, usually May and June when the river backs up into the creek, it may be impassable.

After crossing the creek, I immediately devote my attention to the uncertain footing on the damp rocks. At a particularly awkward lengthy ledge I not so gracefully butt-slide myself down! Then I cautiously continue to plot my route past several very exposed spots above the creek - an unfortunate slip would result in a chilly dunk in the water!

Following Kane Creek to its confluence with the Colorado River, the pathway wanders through a riparian zone of tamarisk, lacy filamented grass, willows and huge cottonwood trees with leaves that glow yellow in the late fall sunshine. Edged by sagebrush, saltbush, rabbitbrush and greasewood, this is a good place to see the birds: chickadees, song sparrows, spotted towhees, scrub jays, juncos and white-crowned sparrows flock to this choice location.

Having left the restricted visibility of the wet zone, the trail now steadily climbs through exposed layers of Kayenta Sandstone while giving increasingly expansive views of the river and the imposing, intense cliffs of Wingate Sandstone that thrust up from the shores of its meandering waterway. With the steady gain in elevation the angle and perception of the far-reaching red rock country constantly changes offering a sweeping panorama of Poison Spider Mesa and the Moab Rim. Almost at the top, the already stunning canvas is enhanced by the cooling vision of the La Sal Mountains rising in the distance, freshly dusted with the powdered sugar appearance of fresh snow.

As you top out at the saddle you will see a sign for the Jackson's Trail. A little further on new signage posts a map with a description for two new trails - the Rockstacker, an ultra technical mountain bike trail and the Pothole Arch, a trail with rolling slickrock domes.

The Jackson's Trail ends at the crest as it merges with the Amasa Back Trail, a popular jeep and mountain bike route that follows the wide switchbacks of an old uranium exploration trail down to Kane Creek. Now I'm on the massive landmark known as the Amasa Back. Named after the cattleman, George Amasa Larsen, who arrived in Spanish Valley in 1880, the Amasa Back is a three-mile, cliff-sided ridge that forms a gooseneck hundreds

of feet above the Colorado River.

the course for the 26-mile Tour of Canyonlands Mountain Bike Race. On the way down, I meet a guy carrying his bike up who considered this feat no big deal! He tells me he can easily do it in 25 minutes. In fact, several years ago he did it twice – up once with his bike and then down and up again with his girl friend's bike!! Chivalry still lives on!!


Jacob's Ladder ends at Jackson's Hole, an abandoned bend in the Colorado River referred to as a rincon. A big rock marks a turnaround for the road to Hurrah Pass. A little further, a solid stone fortress, which was once surrounded by the waters of the river, dominates an enormous chunk of ground, while the vague structures of the Potash Mine appear in the far background. On this last t-shirt and shorts day of October, the steady warm sunshine is undisturbed

by the few puffy clouds that contrast vividly against a clear pastel blue sky. The silence and solitude are stunning - a wonderful break from our noisy technological society. The only sounds to be heard are the occasional buzz of a fly, the echo of a raven's call and the enchanting trill of the rock wren.

Those sheer rock walls now behind and above me stretch in a semicircle around this dished out, sparsely vegetated area. I can see the top from whence I came, but the entirety of the trail has disappeared within the encasement of tumbled down rock and

I struggle to pick out a trail that seems to have vanished into those thick rock walls!! On my slow tiring thrust up through a channel of loose rock, I find a marvelous kokopelli petroglyph making it obvious that this route was discovered long before the early settlers arrived.


In the 1960's an above ground pipeline was laid from Moab through Jackson's Hole to Potash. It crossed Jacob's Ladder in several places and that hurdle halted the herding of horses. Now the equine herds that once traveled this route have given way to the modern mode of hikers and bikers.



before turning left on to a jeep trail that quickly ends at a turnaround. From there I pass under some power lines and follow the two cairns along the rim. Then I swing right and advance towards several more cairns that mark the spot where Jacob's Ladder begins. This steep, rugged trail is not that distinct. As I start this endeavor I sharply remind myself that unless I want to walk the many miles to Hurrah Pass - when one goes down, one must also go back up!

A common route for mountain bikes, it is also part of

Off The Wall Art Gallery -Finding the Unusual

Oh my, the time has whizzed by and Christmas is just around the corner. How can that dilemma of the gift-giving season be here already?! What present can you possibly buy for your mother-in-law - the woman who by now has accumulated everything imaginable?! Where can you go to find that special gift for your sister that isn't going to put you in to bankruptcy?! How can you spring a surprise for your spouse with something truly original?!



The solution could be as easy as taking a peek inside Off The Wall Art Gallery. The minute I walk in the door, the dazzling colors of the contemporary stained glass of Jay Johnson catches my eye. He's been selling his distinctive decorations nation-wide for a number of years and his reasonably priced products would be the perfect gift to make that drab window come alive.

It didn't take long for me to notice that Collette Webster, the owner of the gallery offers more, so much more than what is commonly found in an art gallery - custom sinks, back splash tiles, lighting, pottery, etc. that are sold in a wide range of prices.

Most of the twenty artists on display make their living full time from their art and they take commissions for custom work. As a potter, Collette individually throws

the big and the small. From murals to mugs, she will make to order. Nothing is mass-produced as she comments that she's never created the same two sets of dishes.

Warren Egbert, a licensed contractor, uses his unique craftsmanship to capture the essence of metal as he transforms that medium into creations that are absolutely amazing. With Warren the ordinary indoor/outdoor lighting, garden art, wall accessories and fencing becomes extraordinary.

I've always been fascinated with gourd art and Janice Reich is top notch in turning a plain gourd into a beautiful masterpiece, which can proudly be displayed in your home. She recently presented a two-day workshop at the gallery on her surface decorating techniques, which will be repeated at a later date.

Some of the artists in the gallery are internationally recognized, such as Kory Fluckiger, who has won the cover competition for "Water Color" magazine as well as publishing three books about that craft. Susan Matteson's oil landscapes are touchingly impressionistic. She's also an expert on figure drawing and will demonstrate that technique at a workshop in the spring. If an original painting is out of reach for your pocketbook, a less expensive print is a great alternative.

The *Off The Wall Art Gallery* is open Tuesday through Saturday from 10:00 to 6:00, Sunday from 10:00 to 2:00 and is closed on Monday. It is conveniently located at 225 South 400 East,

Even if you're not looking for that special gift, just come on in anyway and browse - take a look around and talk about the art. As Collette phrases it, "We're artists. We thrive on the attention."

The Bighorn Gallery at Dead Horse Point State Park

The Bighorn Gallery at Dead Horse Point State Park currently features a unique exhibit of photography and paintings by local artists, Catherine Holmburg and Melinda Redd.

Inspired by the "harsh beauty of the desert landscape," a duo of Moab-area artists have combined their talents to create a vibrant exhibit of paintings and photography. Catherine Holmburg and Melinda Redd's artwork will be on display in the Bighorn Gallery at the Dead Horse Point State Park's visitor center through Feb. 28, 2011.

Holmburg intends to evoke an emotional response with her large, colorful oil paintings. She studied art history at Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design and earned a master of fine arts degree from Claremont Graduate University in Claremont, Calif. She said cubism and Dutch still life influence her work, and describes her style as loose, abstract and focused on the process of glazing and impasto. Holmburg is an established artist at the David Barnett Gallery in Milwaukee. She currently teaches art classes at Moab Charter School.

Redd said she attempts to capture the true symbols of the American west in her photographs, from the "subtle exquisiteness of desert blooms" to "the calloused hands of real, live cowboys." Redd has won several awards at San Juan County Fairs, including best of show. One of her photos recently made the front page of the local newspaper, the San Jan Record. Several of her photographs are published in a fine art book, Capture my Utah. Redd currently lives on a cattle ranch in the desert with her husband, raising two young cowboy sons.

DAVE SHARPE - Crowned Prince of Stuntmen

Perhaps the best if not one of the best stuntmen in the history of motion pictures. He was National A.A.U. Tumbling Champion in 1926 and 27. Dave began in pictures back in the early talkies as a child actor, performing whatever dangerous stunts for other youngsters back in the Our Gang Comedies. His first stunt as a teenager was in a Douglas Fairbanks, Sr. movie.

Sharpe moved with his parents from St. Louis, Missouri to Southern California.

During his middle to late teens, Dave starred in several films for Hal Roach Studios - title for the series was the Boyfriends. He not only was the lead actor but did all of his own stunts, primarily acrobatics.


Dave went on as an actor as a grownup starring in some western movies like "Two-Fisted Justice" and "Silver Stallion" and then began working as an actor in the Saturday Matinee Cliffhangers, the action-packed serials especially at Republic Studios. In one particular serial, "Daredevils of the Red Circle", he co-starred with Bruce Bennett (Herman Brix) and the studio hired a fellow stuntman, Jimmy Fawcett to double for him. When Dave found out how much Fawcett was being paid for stunt work, he decided that after the serial was completed, he would get completely into stunt work and so it went. He worked in practically every serial up until WWII broke out and joined the Army Air Force and flew many dangerous missions including in the European battles, gaining him the rank of Captain.

Following his stint in the service, Dave went back into stunt work at Republic and other major studios. He was a close friend of actor Douglas Fairbanks, Jr. and began doubling for him in all his films, including "The Fighting

O'Flynn," "The Exile" and "Sinbad, the Sailor". He also doubled for many of the major motion picture stars including Tony Curtis. When he was fifty-seven years old, Dave took over the action for Tony in "The Great Race."

In the movie "Ten Who Dared," Dave was in Moab to double for actor James Drury down by the river.


Dave Sharpe was inducted and footprinted into the Hollywood Stuntmen's Hall of Fame when it was located in Palmdale, California in 1975 when he was footprinted in cement along with thirty-two other personalities including Burt Reynolds, Lee Majors, Dale Robertson and many of the stunt legends of the movies including Yakima Canutt, Richard Talmadge, Helen Thurston, Babe DeFreest and Polly Burson.



He died of Lou Gehrig's disease at the age of seventy. The Hall of Fame is presently without a home and is interested in talking with anyone who would like to become a Sponsor. The Hall of Fame is a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving the history of the stunt profession and to honoring stunt people the world over.

WINTER SOLSTICE

By the time the full moon rises on December 21, the sun will have reversed its southern progression through the sky. At 4:38pm the sun hovers directly overhead at 23.44 degrees south latitude. Thousands of years ago the sun was in the region of the sky defined by the constellation Capricorn when the winter solstice occurred. That is why world maps mark this latitude as the Tropic of Capricorn. Today, because of precession of the equinoxes (aka wobble of the earth's axis), the sun appears west of this point at the winter solstice in the region of Sagittarius. Sagittarius is visible in the night sky during the summer months (east of Scorpius) very low on the southern horizon from our latitude.

The GWWSC, sponsored by University Corporation for Atmospheric Research in Boulder, CO, seeks to promote interest in astronomy and to monitor the darkness of our night sky. Participants in the local star count detected 5th magnitude stars, despite partly cloudy skies. Visible stars range in magnitude from -1 to 6 (see Note following VISIBLE PLANETS). The quality of our night skies remains good when looking directly overhead, even though a significant light dome does arise above Moab and Spanish Valley. Outdoor lighting (commercial and residential) poses the greatest threat to maintaining our

dark skies as a natural resource. Shields over the tops of outdoor lights direct the light downward where it is useful. Lights that radiate 360 degrees produce glare, waste energy, and reduce the quality of our dark skies. In past years, we have easily detected 6th magnitude stars on clear nights. It is our decisions that determine whether we retain this valuable resource.

Note: Hold your hand at arm's length to measure apparent distances in the sky. The width of the little finger approximates 1.5 degrees. Middle, ring, and little finger touching represent about 5 degrees. The width of a fist is about 10 degrees. The fist with the thumb extended at a right angle equals 15 degrees. The hand stretched from thumb to little finger approximates 20-25 degrees. The diameter of both the full moon and the sun spans only 0.5 degree. Adjust for the size of your hand.

VISIBLE PLANETS

Jupiter - Find Jupiter high in the southwestern sky at evening twilight. By month's end it sets before midnight. On December 13 look for Jupiter's bright yellow orb near the first quarter moon. Jupiter moves from Aquarius to Pisces this month. (Magnitude -2.3)


Saturn - The yellow planet rises in the eastern sky during the night and appears overhead in the morning twilight. A thin waning crescent moon rises with Saturn on December 1 and again on December 31 when Saturn appears above the moon and Spica (Virgo). Saturn is in Virgo throughout the month. (Magnitude +0.3)

Venus - Look in the morning sky a few hours before sunrise for the brightest of all our planets. On December 31 a waning crescent moon rises with Venus. Venus moves from Virgo to Libra this month. (Magnitude -4.4)

Note: Apparent magnitude values range from -4 to +6 for most planets and visible stars. The lower the value the brighter the object. A decrease of 1.0 magnitude is 2.5 times brighter.



Paved Path in Moab Canyon - AKA Old Highway

REJOICE! THE PATH IS READY TO RIDE: The paved path from the Colorado Pedestrian/Bike bridge, all the way to State Route 313 is finished! Sure, you still have to make your way along a crumbling shoulder to get to the pedestrian/bike bridge from Moab, but it's worth it! What a boon for Moab and all bikers in general! The old and brittle riders, (like me) can pedal all the way to Dead Horse



and Canyonlands on our grossly antiquated bikes without leaving our saddles. The young and rubbery can access some great mountain biking trails without having to load their bikes into the truck or atop the car. The new pedestrian/bike bridge allows all of us to ride serenely over the river without worrying about becoming a hood ornament on a Kenworth. Even dog walkers can find a connecting trail to give Fido an aerobic jump start by using the Killer B Trail with its steep ascent up to the boundary of Arches NP. In the early morning, few bikers use this short trail to escape the Moab Brands area trails.

THANKS TO ALL THAT MADE IT HAPPEN! The folks responsible for this astounding feat are numerous. The dreamers, (aka Kim Schappert-Moab Trails Alliance; Ginny Carlson-Former Trail Mix Chair; Russ Von Koch-

BLM Recreation Head; and others) put forth a vision and sold it to the financiers. The financiers gathered the money (the Feds, MTA, Trail Mix, UDOT, Utah State Parks & Recreation, Moab City, Grand County, Transportation District, and private donors). The engineers (Transportation Commission, UDOT, Horrocks Engineering, and Mark Wright-Grand County

Engineer) created the construction plans that would make it work and LeGrand-Johnson Construction made it all a reality.

GEOLOGY: The best part of the ride through the Moab Canyon is that you have time to stop and look at the fascinating geology. The black asphalt ribbon winds its way over and along the river, along the boundary of Arches National Park, then through the "jumping off point" gap and up the sinuous grade around Deadman's Curve to the top where the red rocks of the Cutler Formation and the sandstones of the Glen Canyon Group dominate the western sky. There are even spots where the whine of autos out on the "new" US-191 are silenced by the rock walls along the path.

HISTORY OF THE PATH/ OLD HIGHWAY: When you stop to catch your breath or sip some water, take a look around. The history of this old road tells of the resilience of the folks who call Moab, home. Ancient Puebloans,



Utes, trappers, Spanish traders, and the settlers of this county used this gap in the rocks to cross the river and make a home in Moab and Spanish Valleys. The trail from Thompson was long and rough. Frequent flash flooding and soggy soil stopped travelers and freight wagons for days at a time. When it was decided to improve the road by moving it to less flood prone high ground, prisoners from the State Penitentiary were used to blast the rock and create the grade that you now ride. Only one prisoner escaped, but he was soon found near Dewey Bridge and reunited with his compatriots. Barrels used to transport the 6 tons of blasting powder can still be seen if you have the time to wander down the canyons and look through the flood debris of the last 100 years. If you climb up into the rocks on the east side you'll find remnants of telephone poles, probably dug in around 1900 by J. N. Corbin for the La Sal Mountain Telephone & Electric Company or his son Jack

Corbin for the Midland Telephone Company. In the 1930s the Civilian Conservation Corps men vastly improved the drainage under the old road by constructing more than 20 rock culverts and a bridge. These were all cleaned and preserved during the new path construction. A hole on the inside of the largest CCC culvert was repaired by craftsmen still possessing the skill for this type of stone masonry.

The old highway and its 4-lane replacement have changed monikers many times. It was first an Indian path, then an Explorers' route, then the Old Spanish Trail trading route, then a freighters' road, and finally a US designated POST Road (roads used to deliver the US Mail). In the



1920s it was designated State Route 9 and US Route 450. In 1939, Route 450 was changed to US "Highway" 160, and then to US-163 in 1970. In 1981 it became, and remains, US-191.

Get out your bike or get on your walking shoes and prepare to kindle a connection to a great old trail made all the better with it's wonderful new face lift.

A Tale of Seven Tails

If someone told you five kittens had been found in an eagle's nest, you'd have to wonder why they hadn't been eaten for dinner yet, and if they were alive, why? And you'd really have to wonder if it was true.

Well, it s a true Moab story -- one of those little miracle tales that leaves you feeling warm and fuzzy, like a kitten. Actually, we're talking seven tails, not just the five in the nest. Two other inspirational kitten rescues are part of this tale as well.

And already, two of the seven nursing kittens are in foster homes where they re being hand-fed by caregivers who have pledged to adopt the babies.

The two lucky kitties who have already found homes were among five found alive in an abandoned eagle s nest in Idaho by a woman who climbed a tree to rescue them. Their bizarre birthplace was the beginning of an unusual journey of survival that landed them in Moab, along with another kitten rescued by a teenager who waded the Snake River to an island to save the kitten, and a seventh kitten saved by a little boy who found the baby tabby wandering alone mewing mournfully in a city park.

In the first collaboration of its between pet rescue operations in Rexburg, Idaho and Moab, the litter of felines were brought to Moab for and eventual adoption, and older feral cat that the Humane Society MoabValley had been unable to place was taken to Rexburg, along with an estimated \$300 in donated cat food and



cat toys to help the Rexburg shelter deal with an ever-burgeoning cat population of 110.

The transaction last month took place just in time. Snow arrives in Idaho sooner than Moab. There is little doubt that the lost, tossed and abandoned eaglets would have died if not for the incredibly timely rescues. Besides the first helpers who found the kittens and got them to pet-care people for lifesaving measures, the successful rescues and ongoing care also involved volunteers and monetary contributions from both the Rexburg Humane Society and shelter, Moab s Humane Society and shelter, Four Paws Rescue of Utah/ Idaho, and the Barkery pet retail store in Moab, which donated the cat food and toys.

It was an unusual turn of events that turned out well for all of us, said Candace Billingsley, who took the job as Moab s Humane Society program director in July after moving here from Rexburg, where she d been a pet-adoption coordinator. I'd gone up on a personal trip, which is how this all came together, so this was fortuitous.

A group in Rexburg will take adult cats, but they had a ton of little kitties, Billingsley continued. We ve had such great success with adoptions, so we decided to help this other group. They took on our adult cat and we took on the kitties.

Jodi Johnson, Four Paws Rescue president in Rexburg, said the kittens from the eagle's nest will be bottle babies for awhile, and probably would not have survived if they hadn't been close to being weaned at the time they were saved. In fact, she said, the black kitten in the bunch had fallen out of the nest, and its mewing helped the lady who'd been feeding their feral mother find the kittens.

She had actually been feeding this (mother) cat. It was less than a year old, and she said it had started getting chunky, Johnson said. The mother cat arrived one day slender again, and the woman figured she'd had the kittens – but where?



The momma kept coming to eat, then it was three days since she saw the mother, so she started walking around and listening for kittens, Johnson said. She could hear them crying, so she kept walking around and around. according to Johnson heard, the woman found the kitten that fell, heard mewing above, and climbed the tree about 12 feet to discover the other kittens in the eagle s nest.

They were really,

really hungry, Johnson said. Every three hours they have to be fed.

The Rexburg/Moab experience has helped lead to a better future for unwanted and feral animals here. Kaye Davis, Barkery co-owner with Jessica Turquette, hopes this month to establish an ongoing free pet-food program with a distributor in Washington who donates bags of cat and dog food that have gotten torn or damaged during transportation and can't be put out for sale in stores. It s called the Broken Bag program. In the meantime, needy pet owners — mainly dog owners — have been helped by Ken Bertwell, a member of the Humane Society who gathers damaged bags of pet food from local stores. He s supportive of the Barkery's effort to involve a pet-food distributor, though the challenge will be where to put the supplies. Apparently, under the Broken Bag program, the distributor drops off a huge supply only occasionally or once a year.

With an alarming number of pets growing that are being abandoned or literally tossed into rivers in bags because economic hard times makes it easier to look at pets as disposable, free pet food just may help - a little.

Numbers Rising in Pet Care Needs and Loving Caregivers by Vicki Barker

At the same time horror stories of abandoned animals increase with the downturn in the economy, Moab's pet rescue and adoption programs are kicking into high gear.

After a recent rescue of kittens from an eagle's nest who were brought to Moab from Idaho, Jodi Johnson of Four Paws Rescue, Inc. bemoaned an apparent rise in animal abandonment and deliberate killings. "A woman in Shelley, Idaho saw someone throw a bag in a canal," said Johnson, Four Paws president. "One kitten survived."

In rural areas in particular, Johnson said, if animals are strays, aren't farm stock, or working, "they are expendable." Johnson participated in a recent coordinated effort with the Humane Society of Moab Valley (HSMV) to save a black kitten that obviously survived near-drowning and was wandering on an island on the Snake River, plus the kittens found by a rural resident in an abandoned eagle's nest -- and another kitten found in a Rexburg city park.

All but two of the bottle-fed kittens survived into November, said Candace Billingsley, HSMV program director.

In Moab, more than 1,300 cats have been trapped, neutered and released since Moab started a feral cat Trap-and-Release program (T&R) in 2001, said director Margaret Griffith. Those are the cats you'll occasionally see that are missing the tip of one ear. That helps identify which strays Griffith has tended to and which still need to be fixed.

Griffith has used her 26 traps to aid in cat population control more this year than ever before, she said. "The numbers of abandoned animals are increasing at an alarming rate. We've done 305 just this year."

With the No More Homeless Pets program in Salt Lake City, Griffith has Moab participating in a "trap trading post" to help locate and tend to feral animals. She loans out traps, transports stray animals to a vet for neutering, then releases them in the location where they were trapped.

With winter approaching, Griffith is appealing to donors for coolers that are large enough to transform into a warm home for a cat. She glues the lids of the coolers, cuts a hole in one side for a door, and fills the cooler with straw, which helps keep cats warm on frosty nights.

The newest optimistic development in the pet-care community is the hiring in November of a second staff member at the Humane Society. Nov. 19 was the first day of work for Jaime Guynn, animal coordinator, who will help Billingsley with volunteers' efforts, record-keeping, and generally keeping everything updated at the office (956 Sand Flats Road, where HSMV rents an office at the Moab City Animal Shelter).


Guynn, a Moab native, worked briefly at a vet clinic in Grand Junction and is pleased to be back in her new role. "I love animals and I think this is a wonderful program and I was very happy to get on here and do anything I can to support them."


She will be helping with the newest effort to promote animal care in Moab: The Moab Community Dog Park program. The Humane Society has leased a quarter-acre from the Grand County School District near the Dog and Cat Clinic of Moab on 300 South and will be developing a fenced doggie playground there. They are about to launch a \$30,000 community-wide fundraising campaign for the project, and are seeking in-kind donations of volunteer time, dog toys and materials, and landscaping for the park.

The city named John Geiger to establish a committee to develop the park. Anyone interested in serving on the committee or in other ways are encouraged to call the city or Humane Society (435-259-4862).

Moab Valley has come a long way since a single individual, Pam Walston, started adopting rejected and feral cats in the 1980s, and Karen Weis focused on developing a dog kennel program that helped place and care for abandoned dogs. A charter member of HSMV, Diane Allen was among a small group who organized the program, which achieved nonprofit status in 2000 and can now call on 90 volunteers.

She said it's a given that volunteers "want to do whatever they can do to help animals." With Pet Adoption Days every weekend year-round, and an animal shelter that is always full-to-overflowing, every little contribution helps, Allen said. "People don't need to put in a lot of time -- maybe be a foster home one time for a couple of weeks, or help with office work. The thing is, there are jobs for everyone."

PET HAPPENINGS.

PLAY

The more dogs I see interacting, the less I understand PLAY. What is its definition as it concerns the domestic dog? The overwhelming behaviors I see at public dog parks are social conflict, bullying, avoidance---but almost no behaviors I would define as healthy play.

The current sub-culture in the dog world is that dogs should interact together, and that 'play' with other dogs is somehow believed to be essential for dogs, not just while they're young to 'socialize' them, but throughout their lives as continuing socialization, interspecies communication, aerobic exercise, and 'fun'. I put many of these words in quotations, as I'm not convinced that when we put puppies or dogs together to 'play' they are learning to socialize better, or communicate better with their own species. Because, more often than not, I don't believe the dogs are engaged in healthy play.

I have been visiting and videotaping dog parks all around the country for the last several years. I've also filmed many hours of shelter dog play-groups. While downloading and editing, I have studied, frame by frame, many of the interactions of the dogs, and identified what I have observed to be the least risky, slightly risky, and most risky behaviors.

Least Risky Behaviors:

I have observed the healthiest play to be characterized by the following behaviors:

- 1. Self-Interruption
- 2. Shared Physical Space
- 3. Ability to Compensate and Modify for Size or Power Differences
- 4. Eyes, Head and Spine Not All in Alignment
- 5. Mirrored or Tandem Movements During Play or **During Interruptions**
- 6. Accepted or Reversible Roles

When a dog finds a compatible playmate and they engage in many of the above healthy behaviors, future play dates should be encouraged. It is generally easier for dogs to re-engage with known 'friends', rather than meet and greet and start over again with a constant supply of unfamiliar dogs.

Explanations of Least Risky Behaviors:

Self-Interruption: 1. This is when the dogs playing disengage from each other and pause for a brief period of time. The behaviors most common to self-interruptions are sniffing, orienting to a distraction, and drinking. The interruptions seem to serve as a way to lower arousal levels, and often occur when the play has escalated to a level where one or more of the dogs is getting too rough or overexcited. One of the benefits of owners who actively supervise play is that

they can manually and artificially interrupt play when it escalates and has gone too long uninterrupted, and initiate a time out until all the dogs calm down. A good gage of play that is too edgy or rough is that the dogs can no longer be interrupted verbally by owners or the humans present. This is a good barometer of healthy vs. risky play: can you call your dog and get his attention and get him to stop; if not,

- 2. Shared Physical Space: A difficult quality to describe—but dogs that are playing well are almost like human dance partners, the physical space between them is even, shared, close but not intrusive. The best play partners are dogs who share the air space between them.
- 3. Ability to Compensate and Modify for Size **Differences:** Whether it's a bloodhound playing with Chihuahuas, or a bully breed playing with an Italian greyhound, healthy play exists when the larger or

more powerful of the players adjusts his or her style to accommodate the more fragile of the group. This is often seen when a large dog lies down to wrestle with a smaller dog; or when a physically powerful dog moves slowly or more gently when playing with a dog of dissimilar physical

- 4. Eyes, Head and Spine Not in Alignment: The most relaxed and congenial body language between dogs seems to include, in all dogs engaged, eyes, heads and spines unaligned. When a dog aligns its eyes, head and spine, he seems to be gearing up for a more powerful, intense, and possibly confrontational interaction.
- 5. Mirrored or Tandem Movements During Play or **During Interruptions:** Just like with human friends, dogs seem to pick up on the gestures or movements of one with whom they're getting along—and dogs will often move in mirror images to one another, such as a bow to the right followed by a bow to the left, while the other dog, at the same exact time, bows first to the left and then to the right, creating a Harpo-Marx-in-front-of-the-mirror like moment. Dogs can often be seen sniffing the ground together during breaks in the action, and they will often share the same curve of the spine, the same level of tail carriage, the same timing of air-sniffing, etc. The only exception can be when two dogs from the same household are engaged in play with other dogs. These dogs, while moving like seasoned figure skaters, are however, commonly hunting or bullying other dogs.
- 6. Accepted or Reversible Roles: While I was educated to expect dogs engaged in healthy play to exhibit role reversals, I much more often observe dogs who stay in their roles, but to me it seems balanced as long as both dogs accept their chosen roles. For instance, during games of chase, there are dogs who prefer always to be chased, and rarely, if ever, do the actual chasing. And vice versa. Also, there are dogs who seem to like to play wrestle while lying on the ground or on their backs, which leaves the play partner(s) to take up the standing, or stand-over position, but more often than during swapping of positions, healthy play seems to include an acceptance of and compatibility with preferred positions.


