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

Chuck Hayward

Born Charles Bert Hayward on January 20, 1920 near Hyannis, Nebraska, he grew up with respect and love for horses.

When he was just sixteen he left home and worked in the hayfields and breaking horses. He attended business college in Omaha and then joined the Merchant Marines during World War II on board ship. After the war, he went west and did some rodeo in Wyoming, South Dakota and Nebraska.

In 1947 Chuck tried his luck in California, starting out in Van Nuys. He had some lean years at first and then managed to do some odd jobs working in stables cleaning horse barns and stacking hay. It seemed he was always around horses. He finally got an opportunity to try his hand in the movies and in 1949, Chuck worked in "Fighting Kentuckian" at Republic starring John Wayne. He worked in 24 of Duke's movies and became a lifelong friend.

His career spanned 50 years and he became one of the most respected and admired stuntman and stunt-coordinator. He worked in many of director Henry Hathaway, John Ford and Howard Hawks' films. Ford gave him the name of "good" Chuck. He doubled for such film's legends as

Richard Widmark, John Wayne, Steve McQueen, Clint Eastwood, Yul Brynner and Burt Reynolds.

He and his horse "Twinkle Toes" were in hundreds of films and television shows including "True Grit", "The Searchers", "Rooster Cogburn", "Gunsmoke", "Rawhide", "Tom Horn" and others.

He was in the film, "Rio Grande", in 1950, which was filmed in Moab. He and "bad" Chuck Roberson did many horse falls and fights in this classic. In this film there was a special horse ride called the "Roman Ride" that was actually performed by Harry Carey Jr. and Claude Jarman Jr. It turned out to be one of the highlight stunts of the movie.

Chuck Hayward is one of the honored inductees in the Hollywood Stuntmen's Hall of Fame, which moved to Moab back in 1988 and was opened to the public for 7-1/2 years. Today, the Hall of Fame is without a home and if anyone is interested in learning more about this and other aspects of the Hall of Fame, they may contact John Hagner, its Founder at www.hotmail.com. Desert Wildflowers: The Next Generation

The springtime parade of wildflowers begins in February and March, but will gather speed in the month of April. The diversity of flowering plants starts to blossom (pun intended) and, depending upon the winter and early spring soil moisture content, may result in spectacular displays.

Last year was such a year, where blooming wildflowers created colorful mosaics cloaking the desert. This year will not follow suit because of the lower winter moisture levels, but there should be pockets

wildflowers where abound. I also use the "wildflower" term loosely, to include annuals, perennials and flowering shrubs in this mix.

flowering Some shrubs like greasewood four-winged and saltbush produce small flowers, but they are overlooked in contrast to the showier blooms of cliffrose, blackbrush and Fendlerbush.

Both cliffrose and blackbrush are members of the Rose family, while Fendlerbush is a member of the Hydrangea family. Cliffrose has small, leathery leaves with trilobed tips and blackbrush leaves are short and narrow. The lowergrowing blackbrush may dominate vast acreages, and their 1/2" wide yellow

flowers may bloom in profusion.

In contrast, cliffrose grows singly or in small clusters, but grows taller than its rosy relative. Cliffroses may become cloaked with 1" wide, whitish flowers; the aromatic flowers perfume the air with a powerful sweet scent. Bees and other pollinators are lured to the flowers by this scent. Interestingly, cliffroses may

undergo a second blooming period later in the summer, but the blackbrushes are "one and done."

In contrast to these flowering shrubs and many wildflowers that bloom during the day, yuccas and evening primroses open their flowers in the evening to attract moths as pollinators.

The yuccas attract small, ½" long yucca moths. The moth's pollination strategy is unique and their life cycle is closely tied to that of the yucca. When the female moth visits a flower, she rolls pollen into a small ball

Another night-blooming plant, the evening primrose attracts a different group of moths - the sphinx moth. Nicknamed "hummingbird moths," due to their large size and hummingbirdlike flight, the sphinx moth uses its long proboscis to probe deep within the floral tubes for nectar. While


probing for nectar, the moth's forehead becomes dusted with pollen. When visiting another flower, this pollen is knocked off and completes the cycle of pollination.

Although April may not be the peak month for blooming cacti, both the Whipple's fishhook and cacti hedgehog bloom throughout the month. The hook-shaped spines provide part of the common name. Whipple honors Amiel Wicks Whipple (1818-1863), a topographical engineer who served on the U.S. -Mexico boundary survey in the 1800s and who died during the Civil War.

In contrast to Whipple's fishhook, the hedgehog cactus has straight spines, reminiscent of those on the small mammal the "heggie" or hedgehog. In addition, the hedgehog cactus has reddish flowers, while the fishhook

bears lavender-colored flowers.

Though yearly wildflower displays vary in intensity, one can always count on some plants to bloom and color this landscape in April. The flowers form a spectacular contrast to the surrounding slickrock and to each other.



and carries this pollen ball to another plant. The moth then packs the pollen into the female receptacle of the new flower. In addition to pollinating the flower, the female moth inserts eggs into the ovary of the female flower. This symbiotic action insures pollination of the flower and that her developing larvae will be able to feed upon the maturing seeds.





Deadman's Ridge - Big Sky Country

Are you ready to try out some "brand" new trails that have a nostalgic cowboy flavor? Do you yearn to head off yonder, where there's still ample room to roam? If your answer is "yes", then, pardner, you should round up your gear and head north of town to the big sky country of the "Moab Brand Trails" - a recently completed series of trails that have been built by the Moab Trail Mix Committee. The mission of this volunteer group, which is sponsored by Grand County, is to preserve and develop individual trails and pathways for safe, convenient and enjoyable recreational use within the county. Through their efforts, an extensive system of new trails has been constructed, which opens up new opportunities for mountain biking, hiking

The Bar **M**, Circle **O**, Rocking **A** and Bar **B** are the cattle brands that have been used to name the first four trails, and the single letters have been cleverly arranged to spell **MOAB**. Adding a little more spice to this cowboy lingo, the Lazy-EZ Trails are also available for your consideration. Mounted on your faithful mountain bike or rambling along for an out-of-the-saddle hiking experience, you'll find plenty of wide-open space to explore. If you throw in the sidekick trails of the Killer B, Long Branch, North 40 and Deadman's Ridge, you have a variety of challenging routes, that should keep a cowpoke busy and happy for at least a couple of hours!

and cross-country skiing in the nearby La Sal Mountains.



To get to the Moab Brands trailhead, drive north out of town on Highway 191 for nine miles and turn right at the signs for the Bar-M Chuckwagon and Bar M Trails. Then, swing a sharp right to go directly south on a graveled dirt road. In about one half a miles, the paved Colorado River-Gemini Bridges bike/pedestrian pathway comes in under the highway through a culvert and continues its course alongside the dirt road, which you are driving on. As bike path and road run their parallel course, only a wire fence separates them, and at this merger, the road has narrowed down to one lane, with strategically placed pull-outs to avoid oncoming traffic.

After two miles, the roadways split - the 8.5 mile bike/pedestrian pathway continues on through Moab Valley, and the dirt road turns east. Soon after that, a four-wheel drive, high clearance vehicle is needed to negotiate a small section of large rocky protrusions. Parking, however, is available before that at the bulletin board, with overflow parking immediately to the left.

Not too far past the 4X4 section on the road, which is now part of the Bar B Trail, the Lazy-EZ Trails start on the left and move along in a northerly direction. Immediately after that, on the right, the Deadman's Ridge Trail also begins. The 1.2 mile connection of this trail to the other end of the Bar M is open, but the remaining portion, which drops steeply over to the paved bike path, is still under construction.

The name Deadman's Ridge intrigues me, and after crossing the wooden bridge, I start my circuitous walk. Miles and miles of visibility reach out to the Bookcliff Mountain Range on the northern horizon, while the alpine wonderland of the La Sal Mountains dominates the southeastern skyline. Closer in, I absorb the extensive



views of the Bar-M Chuckwagon, Archview Campground and Seven Mile Canyon, as well as Moab Canyon, which is bordered on the western side by the sheer cliff walls of Navajo Sandstone. In this vast uplifted land, I am transported to another dimension — a euphoric feeling of being disconnected from all the entrapments of civilization and traffic that exist below.



Beyond a crest in the trail, those telltale sights of the modern world disappear - now the big screen picture is completely dominated by a wilderness setting, as the impressive profiles of Skyline Arch and The Windows in Arches National Park come into view. This scene deserves a much longer look, and a slanted rock conveniently provides me with a comfortable backrest. Cherishing this undisturbed time of contemplation, when the trails are still so empty, I look down on a land of rocks, rocks and more rocks – up-ended rocks, protruding rocks, piles of rocks that dot the vast terrain of the rich brown-colored earth.

A pair of horned larks, voicing their distress with calls that sound like tinkling glass, flee from my intrusion. I always catch glimpses of these elusive birds in the driest of the dry land. For whatever reason, their preferred habitat is the most barren real estate they can possibly find. Even their genus name, *Eremophilla*, is Latin for "desert-loving," which describes their fondness for bare, open ground. In their meager existence, they somehow manage to scrounge up weed seeds, waste grains, caterpillars, ants, wasps, grasshoppers and spiders.

Sometimes these tenacious birds flock together by the thousands, but at this time of year they are splitting off to set up housekeeping. It seems early in the mating season to establish a breeding territory, but then horned larks are one of our earliest nesting birds, raising as many as three broods a year.

For years, I wondered if these sparrow-sized birds really had those tufts of feathers that looked like horns, or was it a figment of someone's imagination? Since I was never able to sneak in for a close enough look, I couldn't be sure until a courting male came in to strut his stuff. I didn't move a muscle, and unaware of my presence, he hung around. Now, I could clearly observe the yellowish face and throat, the black eye stripe, the black bib, and best of all, I finally verified: These birds really do have horns!


Winter has been marching on and the last of the snow and mud is gone. A quagmire no longer exists, and the going is now so easy. The sunshine plays peek-a-boo with dark thunderheads, which have been gathering all day in a rain-threatening mood - big puffballs of fleecy looking black-and-white sheep that accentuate the intense blue sky. I watch in fascination as they grow and embrace - connect and disconnect, as fat bellied clouds give birth to more clouds. Suddenly, however, rain seems imminent and that triggers my response to start moving on!

Dropping down to the east, there is a major intersection with the Bar B, Bar M and Rocking A Trails. If you're pressed for time, the quickest, most direct way back to the trailhead is the Bar B Trail. From this location, the corridor of Courthouse Wash can be seen, and if you do have the time, it is worth the short walk over the gray slickrock to peer down on the sheer walls that enclose the width of this canyon.



By late afternoon, the shadows have started creeping across the desert land. As the last solar rays illuminate the oddly shaped rock structures and highlight the snow-covered La Sals, the sun gradually meets the earth with a brilliant explosion of colors – a memorable performance marking the end of a great day in this big sky country.







How To Get A Drink...

...In Moab, Utah

Recent changes to Utah Liquor Laws have made it less confusing and easier to get an alcoholic drink. You can now go to a restaurant or a tavern and without ordering food , you can order a drink.

Some restrictions may still apply as to where you can sit in a particular establishment when consuming alcohol.

For example, Zax has an adult atmosphere in the Watering Hole where you can order a cocktail and watch your favorite sporting event on their 13 tvs, with or without ordering food. This locally owned full-

service restaurant serves their entire menu in both the Watering Hole and restaurant. However, if you sit in the family dining restaurant, you need to order food to consume an alcoholic beverage.



The Moab Brewery, Moab's only on-site microbrewery, offers a variety of locally brewed beers in their tavern, as well as being available at other restaurants in town. Many flavors are on sale at retail stores in Moab as well in the Salt Lake City area.

Eddie McStiff's Restaurant, Brew Pub and Bar has 12 beers on tap and a tiki bar where you can get a glass of wine or a cocktail or beer without ordering food.

The Rio Sports Bar & Grill boasts Moab's largest selection of liquor with indoor and outdoor seating (must be 21 years or older).

Also new is the addition of two upscale lounges in Moab. Vista Lounge located inside Buck's Grill House and The Ghost Bar, upstairs at Jeffrey's Steakhouse. Both locations have a sophisticated and casual atmosphere to relax and wait for dinner or to just stop in at the end of the day and have a drink to unwind.

Moab has two local wineries. Castle Creek Winery is located at Red Cliffs Lodge, 15 miles from Moab on Scenic Highway 128 (The River Road). Spanish Valley Vineyards is located just off Highway 191, south of Moab about 6 miles on Zimmerman Lane. Both wineries have on-site tasting rooms and wine available for sale. Utah State Liquor Stores also sell many local wines. If you would like to try some of these award winning vintages, look for restaurants serving these Moab wines.

The Utah State Liquor Store is the only location where you can purchase bottled liquor, wine and beer with an alcoholic content above 3.2%. The Moab store is

located at 55 West 200 South and is open from Monday through Saturday (11:00 am to 9:00 pm - May 1st to November 1st and from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00

p.m - November 1st to May 1st). They are closed on Sundays and Holidays.

Beer (3.2% alcohol content) for take-out can be purchased at food stores and convenience stores for off-premise consumption only. Onpremise beer (you can drink it here) is available at various licensed locations, including taverns, golf courses,

 $b\,o\,w\,l\,i\,n\,g$ —alleys, —and restaurants that have the required beer license.

Utah law forbids open containers in or about any motor vehicle. A blood alcohol level of 0.08% (0.05% if you have a child in the car with you) is the maximum allowable under Utah Code to be declared "driving under the influence."

I conducted the survey amongst some townpeople here in Moab and my Facebook friends. Coca-Cola and Pepsi have been engaged in a battle over consumer's taste buds for many years. Although, Coca-Cola contains fewer amounts of sugar and calories as compared to a can of Pepsi many blind taste tests prove that Coca-Cola is the preferred branded cola over Pepsi. I have found that many cola consumers claim they enjoy the taste of a Coke more than the taste of a Pepsi.

I set up shop inside my step-mother's business and conducted a survey asking cola consumers to pick which branded cola they prefer and why they prefer that cola. I also posted on my Facebook status for people to answer the controversial question. The results came flooding in. I was able to obtain 48 people's opinions. In my research I found that 20 people preferred Coke while only 16 people preferred Pepsi. The reasons as to why people preferred Coke varied in responses such as:

"Coke has bite."

"Coke stays fizzier longer than Pepsi."

"Coke has just the right amount of sweet to its flavor."

"Coke has fewer calories than Pepsi."

"Pepsi leaves a nasty aftertaste in my mouth. Yuck!"

"Less sweet. More refreshing."

"Habit."

"I grew up on it."

The people that preferred Pepsi over Coke had responses such as:

"Pepsi tastes sweeter."

"Pepsi doesn't sting the back of my throat."

"Pepsi mixes better with my liquor than Coke."

"Tastes a whole lot better than Coke."

"Coke tastes like syrup! Pepsi has better flavor."

"Coke's acidity is too high and is hard on my stomach."


I decided to take my field study one-step further and preform a blind taste test to see if I could turn the Pepsi drinkers into Coca-Cola lovers such as myself. In cup A Coca-Cola was added and in cup B Pepsi was added. I then asked each participant to take a drink and report back which drink they thought occupied cup A and cup B as well as, which cup they preferred drinking. When all the data was collected and reviewed my assumptions were found to be proven. The 3 previously reported as avid Pepsi drinkers in fact preferred cup A as compared to cup B in the blind taste test, while 2 of the previously reported avid Coca-Cola drinkers were found to prefer cup B over the taste of the cola in cup A. This information baffled me. Further research was necessary.

Researchers in this Coke vs. Pepsi war have found that people have a more memorable response to Coca-Cola as compared to Pepsi. After surfing the internet to find any other blind taste tests done in this Coke vs. Pepsi war I came across a study conducted at Baylor College of Medicine. The students at Baylor College had 67 subjects hooked up to an MRI machine. They were able to prove "Your brain connects brand imagery with brand preference." Their research showed that Coke was preferred 75% to 25% compared to Pepsi. It also showed that Coke was more likely to light up the brain parts related to things like memory and cognitive control whereas Pepsi did not have the same effect on the test subjects.

If Coke is preferred over Pepsi then one would assume that the sales should reflect this observation. Further research showed that since 2005 stock price in Coke has gained 35% while Pepsi has only gained 3%. Over the last several years Coca-Cola's stock has significantly outperformed Pepsi Co. Coca-Cola's market cap is currently 33% higher than Pepsi's. However, Pepsi generated over 40% more revenues than Coca-Cola, which is predicted to widen further in coming years. Pepsi and Coke both offer similar dividend yields of 3%. Although, Pepsi's dividend payout ratio is slightly lower than Coca-Cola's the difference is marginal. The findings suggest that neither one has a significant advantage over the other brand.

While conducting my survey I also encountered many people who did not prefer either soda. 7 people who participated stated they didn't drink soda, 3 people preferred Mountain Dew, and one preferred Diet Coke. I think the most surprising answer I received came from a gentleman who responded on his survey that when he is on the West Coast of the United States he prefers Pepsi but if he is on the East Coast then he prefers Coke. I am from Cincinnati, Ohio and a majority of the Facebook surveys were answered by my friends back east. Interestingly, they polled more likes for Coke than Pepsi. Is it an East Coast, West Coast battle now over soda? I can conclude one thing from this study though, and that is that cola drinkers seem to be very faithful to their preferred cola brand.

45th Annual Moab Jeep Safari: April 16 - 24, 2011

The 45th Annual Easter Jeep Safari for 2011 is a collection of trail rides, mostly day-long trips, that will depart from Moab, Utah, during the nine days from April 16 through Easter Sunday, April 24. Visiting families provide their own four-wheel-drive vehicles, bring their own lunches and non-alcoholic beverages, and load up good-to-have items like sun lotion and perhaps protection from the chance of rain or even snow flurries. There are no restrictions as to manufacturer of the vehicle, but high clearance four-wheel-drives are expected. ATV's, UTV's and Motorcycles cannot be



to find. The problem in finding the Safari routes is knowing which of the many old trails to take.

On Big Saturday (April 23rd), 1000 or more vehicles that have lined up in trail groups near the center of Moab will do a controlled "big bang" departure in all directions. This is said to be one of the biggest parades in the world in terms of numbers of vehicles involved in a single event. If you happen to be in town on Saturday morning, don't miss this motorized madness starting at 9:00 AM.

4X4 Trade Show

A little known but popular event during "Jeep Safari" is the vendor trade showand exposition, scheduled for Thursday & Friday, April 21st & 22nd the Old Spanish Trail Arena (large brown building on the east side of Hwy 191 five miles south of the center of Moab).

There will be over 140 indoor and outdoor displays of 4-wheel drive products. Manufacturers come from all over the United States to display their 4x4 related products to the attendees. The show is free and is open to the public. The product displays are mostly items of interest to the "4-wheel crowd," but some spaces have been donated to worthy causes that are directly related to Easter Jeep Safari activities.

Many vendors have contributed products to a raffle which is held on Friday evening after the annual Boy Scout Dinner, which is scheduled to begin at 5:30pm. This annual product give-a-way is a major benefit to the registered participants of the Safari.

The drawings have been popular enough to create real traffic jams near the Arena, so please be patient with parking and traffic control officials.

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

Medieval Camping Event returns to Moab

May 13th -15th the canyons near Moab will echo with the sound of sword fighting, archery, music and fun as the Society for Creative Anachronisms hosts its Arabian Nights event. The annual Arabian Nights events bring hundreds of enthusiastic fans of the Medieval history to the Moab area to spend a weekend camping and enjoying medieval activities.

Founded in 1966 the Society for Creative Anachronisms, or SCA, began when group a friends decided to hold a tournament to celebrate the middle ages. The event was such a success that the group began to regularly hold events where they could participate in what they called "the best" of the Middle Ages. Today 45 years later the organization has grown to nearly to nearly 30,000 members with thousands more who participate in their events every year.

SCA events are different than a Renaissance fair, as all who attend the event are invited participate in the activities. Visitors to events are encouraged to dress the part of a person who could have lived between the years 600 AD and 1600 AD. Events include tournaments, classes on crafting historical items, children's activities, royal courts, dances, feasts and many more opportunities to experience the

middle ages. Every year hundreds of events take place across the world.

Most SCA Events are sponsored by a local chapter such as the Riding of Redbridge located here in Moab. Chapters cover various geographical areas and are organized by different names by their size. For example the Riding of Redbridge is a subchapter of the Province of Arrows' Flight. Arrows' Flight is in turn part of the Kingdom of Artemisia which covers parts of Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, Montana, and Colorado. Twice a year kingdoms like Artemisia choose a king through a tournament of arms.

Kings and their Queens often

attend events and travel about their kingdoms giving awards and recognition to SCA participants. They award Knighthoods to those who show mastery of arms, Laurels

are awarded to skilled artisans, and those who show service to the Society are given the award of Pelican. Other awards and titles are often given as well.


Events of like Arabian Nights are not the only activities that the SCA does. Often local groups will hold fighter practices, arts and science nights, and populace meetings to help participants practice and create the clothing and items they need for events. The SCA also hold larger symposiums and collegiums where crafts, techniques, and research is presented. 
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MOUNTAIN BIKING

TRAIL HAPPENINGS

Moab Bike Trails - Lots of New Trails

Moab has a long history of offering challenging mountain bike trails and it can be quite intimidating for someone who is new to the sport, or riding in Moab for the first time. I still remember getting lost on Monitor & Merrimac in 1996 and choking on tears on Slickrock in 1998, so here is a brief update on what is new and exciting

with the local Moab biking scene. Since I devote my life to mountain biking, it's fun to talk to friends who only ride their bikes occasionally.

The MOAB Brands Trails are very popular with locals and visitors alike. These trails are a combination of singletrack and old jeep roads with the emphasis on singletrack that are part of the Bar M Mountain Bike Focus Area. Once on the trails, the La Sal Mountains begin to shape a major part of your vista, as well as the Windows district of Arches National Park.

Two of the newer trails that are less technical are Lazy and EZ. These are not necessarily easy but they provide a singletrack experience while not posing a lot of technical challenges. Another new trail, named Deadman's Ridge, (named after a curve on the old Hwy.) is ready to ride for the first half with the second half to be completed soon. Yet another trail in the Brands System is the North 40, that is currently under construction, Since the Brands Trails are a great place to start if your group that has varying ability levels. If you are driving, the access from town is approximately 9 miles north of Moab on Hwy 191. Turn east at the Bar M Chuck Wagon and park at the information kiosk. Add

pedestrian bridge and up the paved path known as the Moab Canyon Trail.

Another new trail in Moab is the Pipe Dream trail, a dream come true. It is technical singletrack that you can access from your house or motel in Moab. Locals love this trail, and so will visitors as it will soon be "discovered".

Three points of access are from the top of Aspen Drive off of Doc Allen Dr., Jackson Street (4th east) in Moab, or south of town, off of Hwy 191 look for the Hidden Valley/Pipe Dream sign before the Shell gas station.

News Flash!!! Just finished two weeks ago are three "new" trails, now ready to ride in the Gemini Bridges area. After viewing the Gemini Bridges, continue down the road a short distance to discover the new Arth's Corner Trail on your left. This is a great new intermediate trail that winds through the pinions and junipers, around small canyons to connect with the Metal Masher road, which leads you to the next new trail, Little Canyon Singletrack. The singletrack trail is at the jct. of Gemini Rd. and Metal Masher, and continues along benches, twisting and turning to reach a junction with the Gold Bar 4x4 road. Here you will find the newly marked Gold Bar Singletrack

trail heading up the slickrock. This is for hardy skilled bikers with a continuous l mile climb.

The old favorite trails still are still the standard, and if a challenge is what you are looking for, ride Amasa Back to Rockstacker to Jackson's. Rockstacker is full of slickrock rollers that will challenge most technically advanced riders. Jackson's trail has some steep switchbacks that are likely to cause your heart to beat a bit faster. Access this trail by driving Kane Creek Rd out approximately 6 miles out of Moab to a well marked parking area.

Poison Spider Mesa to the Portal trail is a good combination of a workout and a downhill run that has some

Hike-a-Bike sections. Poison Spider Mesa is primarily a climb up an old jeep road that includes long slickrock sections, some sand, and views of the La Sal Mountains, and Little Arch. The Portal trail is a long technical descent that includes narrow exposed sections and plenty of challenge for even the more advanced riders. Access is from Highway 191 (north of the bridge), then turn onto Highway 279 (Potash Road) for approximately 6 miles to the Trailhead. Poison Spider is also a favorite of ORV's.

We highly recommend carrying a map, and plenty of water. Maps are available at any of the Moab bike shops, and the shops can provide trail recommendations for various skill levels.



Trail Mix is an advisory committee to Grand County in the development and maintenance of non motorized trails. The committee represents non motorized users including bikers, hikers, equestrians, and skiers. Many government agencies and private citizens make up the "mix" that makes this group work so well. The Romance of the Two Wheeler

Bicycles have always meant freedom for me. When I was five my family was visiting an aunt and uncle on their farm outside Salmon, Idaho. My cousin, who was two years older than me, had a little bike with solid metal disks rather than spokes in the wheels. I wanted badly to ride it. Denny said it was all right with him and my dad offered the incentive of buying me my own bike if I learned to ride in the three days we were there. There were no training wheels, but it wasn't far to the ground and the ground was dirt, so after many falls I got the hang of it and was riding by the time we left.

Since first new, blue and white, Sears bike with which my parents paid up on their promise, I have equated freedom riding a bike. It was a little big with it's twentyfour inch wheels, but I could ride around neighborhood and to the corner grocery store for penny candy. Later, a bike meant going with the gang to the

canal to swim, getting to school and the library quickly, and checking out the roiling carp in the lake shallows.

I put the bicycle away in an attempt at social acceptance in high school and didn't really ride again until coming to Moab as a young adult. The mountain bike boom hadn't hit here yet, in fact Moab had yet to see a fat tired, multi-geared mountain bike, but my husband had an old Raleigh ten speed which I took over and rode until I got my first mountain bike, a Bridgestone.

Today, there are hundreds of specialized bikesfrom the heavy duty downhill racers, to the extremely light and pared down roadies and everything in between, which is where most of us find our favorite commuter and work horse. For town commutes, I ride an old beach cruiser with a large front basket, seven gears in an internal hub and coaster brakes. Crusiers are heavy, but the big tires and upright position save my back. And with their longer wheel base they are more stable than the short mountain or road bike.

Here's the romance--the beach cruiser was designed and sold originally by a couple of surfers in San Diego to carry their boards to the beach. So, lean back and imagine the sound of the surf just around the corner as you cruise Moab

Denise Oblak of Canyon Voyages says, "If I am going to commute on my bike, I want to be comfortable." Denise has fenders (no muddy pant legs), a front rack, disk brakes, tires that roll easily but aren't too skinny for cracks and potholes, easy grip shifts for multiple gears and a reliable kick stand. Seats can be big and comfy or smaller and more efficient, and the post can be outfitted with a small shock absorber to further the comfort. Then there's coffee-a place to carry your mug could be the tipping point between a Prius and bicycle for some people and of course the cafe cruiser has one.

Consider these safety features--front and rear lights, a bell, and a good helmet properly fit. Riding with traffic is safer. Drivers are used to looking for cars so, if you are where they expect to see a motorized vehicle, in a left turn lane for example, they will be likely to see you. Go ahead and stick your arm out there so drivers know your intent.

For those who need to haul loads that don't fit in a front basket, like children, there are trailers of many designs. The innovation that made trailers practical, especially for carrying children, was a hitch system allowing the bike to go down without turning over the trailer. Children are not the only awkward loads people need to carry. Dave Bodner, owner of Miguel's Baja Grill, was using his bike to do errands for the restaurant, but the liquor pick up was heavy and awkward so he bought a flat bed trailer.

The length is adjustable and he could literally carry a refrigerator if need be.

Local racer Jenna Woodbury has found that carrying two growing twins works best in a sort of reverse tricycle with a box on the front between the wheels. The customized big box is great for the kids, since they have a view forward plus back at mom when they need a little reassurance. The next time you order a pizza from Paradox, you just may see a modified bicycle out at the curb. This design puts the box between the front wheel and the crank. As an employee

said, "If the customer is close, we just jump on the bike and make the delivery. It's faster and lot more fun."

The major bike companies like Specialized (Rim Cyclery), Trek (Poison Spider), and Cannondale (Moab Cyclery) have extensive lines of comfortable "rides". Electra (Chili Pepper) has carved out their niche with the townie or cruiser. Salsa, Surly and Civia (Uranium Bikes) are all smaller companies that have focused more on the commuter. Maybe a vintage Schwinn Debutante from Mi Vida says freedom to you. Or, see what you can find at Wabi Sabi and do your own refurbishing. It is worth spending some time to get the bike that fits your commuting needs and fits you physically. Ask if the dealer will guarantee the fit when you order.

As we encourage a cycling culture, there are more and more amenities. We have enough bike lanes and walking/biking paths in Moab to avoid U.S. 191, for the most part. With good paths and lanes in town, imagine riding down from Cedar Hills and Spanish Valley on a commuter bike lane. It's perfect with the no sweat ride to work and the after work workout on your way home.

Bicycling is a win for everyone--less pollution, less road wear, good exercise, fuel savings and the glorious breeze on your face--the breeze that says, "Your free!"







DAYLENGTH

By month's end, sunrise jump starts the day by 41 minutes and sunset lengthens it by 28 minutes. Twilight also extends the period of usable light. Civil twilight, marks the period one-half hour before sunrise and after sunset when light is adequate for most outdoor activity. Nautical twilight is the half hour before and after civil twilight. It spans the time it takes for overhead skies to become light at dawn and dark at dusk. Astronomical twilight continues another half hour during which the horizon begins to brighten at early dawn or darkens at the end of dusk. The time of sunrise and sunset assumes a flat horizon. Actual time may vary depending upon the landscape.

METEOR EVENTS

April's meteor activity begins around April 7 in the vicinity of Draco, a circumpolar constellation. Meteors from circumpolar constellations are visible several hours before midnight. A waxing crescent moon sets early enough to provide good viewing conditions. Virgo is another good source for meteors this month. Three separate showers from Virgo span most of the month. Best viewing for these showers is between midnight and astronomical twilight. The last two weeks of April are noted for impressive fireballs most likely to occur after midnight. Many fireballs are bits of rocky debris, often large enough to reach the ground before burning up. A waning full moon could obscure all but the brightest.

The major meteor event of April comes from the Lyrid Meteor Shower. The Lyrids are active April 16-25. As many as 20 meteors per hour can be seen during its peak on April 21/22. However, a waning gibbous moon will impede viewing.

April's deep red alpenglow on high desert walls, alpine peaks, and high cirrus clouds more than make up for the

absence of sunsets across a low western horizon. The long

wavelengths of red and orange light that project high into

the sky after sunset reflect off water and dust molecules in

Note: Hold your hand at arm's length to measure apparent distances in the sky. The width of the little finger approximates 1.5 degrees. Middle, ring, and little finger touching represent about 5 degrees. The width of a fist is about 10 degrees. The fist with the thumb extended at a right angle equals 15 degrees. The hand stretched from thumb to little finger approximates 20-25 degrees. The diameter of both the full moon and the sun spans only 0.5 degree. Adjust for the size of your hand.

VISIBLE PLANETS

Jupiter - On April 7 Jupiter emerges from behind the sun and graces the morning twilight. It won't be visible until midmonth when it rises on the eastern horizon with Pisces about one-half hour before sunrise. Mars (fainter) hangs about three degrees above Jupiter and Venus (brighter) hangs about 10 degrees above Jupiter. (Magnitude -2.1)

Mars - Three visible planets crowd the morning sky this month. The red orb of Mars becomes visible a few days before Jupiter makes its appearance in the eastern sky. Look for Mars around the middle of April as it rises on the eastern horizon (with Pisces) about seven degrees below Venus. (Magnitude +1.2)

Saturn - The lone visible planet in the evening and night skies this month is Saturn. Saturn rises on April 1 just as the sun sets. As the month progresses, it rises earlier each night. By month's end it appears about 45 degrees above the horizon when it becomes visible at nautical twilight. Saturn shines slightly brighter this month for two reasons. Its opposition point with Earth occurs during the first week of April. Opposition marks the point when the earth passes between the sun and an outer planet. That puts Saturn at the closest point in its orbit to Earth. The plane of Saturn's rings are also tilted more towards Earth right now which increases the luminosity of the planet. (Magnitude +0.4)

Venus - The first of the three planets to appear in the morning twilight is Venus. It rises at the end of astronomical twilight, about one hour before sunrise. On April 30 it appears about seven degrees south of a waning crescent moon. (Magnitude -4.0)

Note: Apparent magnitude values range from -4 to +6 for most planets and visible stars. The lower the value the brighter the object. A decrease of 1.0 magnitude is 2.5 times brighter.



Riding the Intrepid Trail System

A visit to Dead Horse Point State Park includes something for everyone, whether you are camping, hiking with your dog, mountain biking or interested in photography. The Intrepid Trail System at Dead Horse Point State Park is a new system of three nested loops and is the only trail at the park open for mountain biking. Maps are available online at www.stateparks.utah.gov/parks/dead-horse, at the visitor center and are placed along the trail. Be sure to bring plenty of water, food, a helmet, sunscreen, sunglasses and a camera! Remember, dogs are not allowed on the Intrepid Trail, but are welcome on all other park trails on a leash! Please stay on the trail, as desert plants and biological soil crust are fragile and grow very slowly.


The one-mile Intrepid Loop is an easy, short ride for all members of the family. A short slickrock section winds through pinyon-juniper forest and is a great place to tune your suspension for the rest of the trail. Spring wildflowers start blooming in April and can be seen until early June.

The Great Pyramid Loop is for riders looking for a short adventure. This 4.2-mile ride is perfect for a quick introduction to the mountain biking experience. It takes most people an hour or so to finish this loop, which offers great views of the mesa top and canyons below. A short hike (please park your bikes!) leads to the Colorado River Overlook with spectacular views of the La Sal Mountains, Chimney Rock and Pyramid Butte.

The nine-mile Big Chief Loop includes views of canyons and interesting rock formations. Six colorful rock layers are visible from Dead Horse Point State Park, showing off millions of years of geological processes. This trail is more challenging with a few technical areas including sandy areas, small ledges and sharp curves. As you wind your way deeper into the more remote areas of Dead Horse Point keep an eye out for park wildlife. Mule deer, porcupines and kit foxes have been seen in the park. This ride is perfect for those wanting an exciting challenge, surrounded by incredible scenery with no crowds.

Stop at the visitor center for snacks and bottled water. T-shirts and other items featuring the Intrepid Trail are also available.





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


"Auto art" is the featured theme for the month of April. Warren Egbert's new creations have been designed from car and truck parts, and other artists have also created "new art" out of old cars.

Paintings by Page Holland Featured at Dead Horse Point State Park






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
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SOUTHEASTERN UTAH MAP





Responsible Dog Ownership

Adding a dog to your family is often an emotional experience, in which you look at the ball of fur that you might take home and melt. As adorable as puppies and dogs can be, it is essential that you remember how much work taking care of a dog is before you adopt one! If you are a prepared, responsible dog owner, you and your pet will co-exist happily.

Did you think about this?

Dog ownership should always be premeditated; a dog is not something to get on a whim. Sadly, many dogs are abandoned or relinquished each year after they were given as gifts or purchased out of the back of a truck at a grocery store and their novelty wore off. If you decide you can not keep the dog and not return the dog to the organization you got them from (almost all rescue organizations will make you do this though) make sure that the next owner is prepared to accept the responsibilities of owning the dog.

Can you afford a dog?

The reality is that very few people have any idea how much owning a dog costs and grossly underestimate it. It is important to understand what owning a dog costs so you can take the ownership and responsibility much more seriously. Most people would not dream of investing \$10,000 on car they know nothing about, had no warranty, had not driven, and was completely unsuitable for their use. Yet people do this way too often when they get a dog without researching its breed characteristics, medical history, parental history, let alone the financial costs that are going to be incurred.

Besides the price of purchasing or adopting the dog, you need to make sure that you can pay for vet care, pet food, supplies, training, and the gear your dog will need. Without taking in to account any special needs, injuries, allergies and extra deposits on homes if you rent, the average cost of having a dog can cost up to over a \$1000.00 per year. It all adds up, so make sure you can fit it all into your budget!

Do you have the time for a dog?

You may have all the love in the world, but dogs need time and attention more. The amount of time and attention a dog needs depends upon its breed and age, but you will need to determine if you have the time to take the dog out for exercise (being left in the yard to amuse themselves IS NOT exercise), and be around it at home. Most dogs will survive if left home during a workday, but if you work really long hours, every day in a week, travel a lot, or just are hardly ever home, think twice about dog ownership. Remember that while you are at work, out with friends or running errands, your dog is usually just waiting for you to come home.

Spay and Neuter

Millions of pets are euthanized each year because of pet overpopulation. If you do not have your dog spayed or neutered you may be contributing to this problem. If your dog is suitable for breeding, be a responsible breeder and follow the proper protocols. Your dog should be a quality, healthy purebred with no congenital or hereditary problems. Breeding dogs is not just a hobby, it is a way of life and if you can not afford to ensure the health and wellbeing of all of the animals in the process then you should not be breeding. You can help save lives – please sterilize your pets!

Provide proper identification.

Quite often when people have lost their dog the first question I will ask is if they had tags and the second will be if they are micro-chipped and more often than not the answer is no. Your dog should wear a collar at all times with current identification. Consider micro-chipping your dog for an added layer of protection. Proper identification can help you become reunited with your dog if lost rather than letting your dog become one more homeless pet in an overcrowded shelter.

Keep your dog healthy.

Proper nutrition is a fundamental for keeping all dogs healthy. Diet directly affects your dog's skin and coat, weight, energy level and most importantly gastrointestinal function. If a problem occurs in one of these areas, it is almost always linked to an inappropriate or deficient diet. Choose a high-quality dog food free of corn, wheat, soy, by-products and "mystery meat ingredients" and feed it in an appropriate portion. Always provide plenty of fresh water. A place of shelter and comfort is also important for your dog's physical and mental wellness, and exercise is a must. Because of their survival instincts, dogs are not as likely to show pain or illness like we do. Regular vet visits can help prevent serious health problems and detect minor issues before they become chronic.

Train Your Dog.

No one enjoys being around an unruly, disobedient dog. Obedience training, proper socialization, housebreaking and training them to follow basic commands will actually strengthen the bond between you and your dog, leading to a happier and less stressful life together. If your dog's misbehavior results in any sort of accident, injury or similar incident, you must take full responsibility for that behavior.

Respect Others, Be Respected.

This may seem like common sense to most of us, but there are still dog owners out there who do not "get" it. Please help give dog owners a good name by following these rules...

 Keep your dog on a leash or in a fencedin yard when outdoors. Even where it is legal to allow your dog off-leash, you should supervise them at all times and have recall. Even if you are convinced your dog won't do

anything at the dog park, on a hike or at the dog store; you do not know how someone else's dog will react when they meet your good dog.

- Do not leave a barking dog outdoors. Continuous barking is not only unfair to your dog; it is rude and annoving to neighbors. A bark collar is rarely the solution as the barking is often a symptom of a greater problem such as separation anxiety and so the dog is only being punished for something they are already anxious about.
- Pick up after your dog. No one wants to step in or smell that "gift" your dog left behind. Please pick it up right away and dispose of it properly. Or if you need to think of it this way, all of that dog poop you leave on the ground will eventually end up in your drinking water so clean it up!

Owning a dog is not just a privilege, it is a responsibility. Our dogs depend on us for, at minimum, food and shelter, and deserve much more. If you are considering bringing a dog into your life, you need to think seriously about the commitment that dog ownership entails. If you already have a dog, you need to consider if you are fulfilling all of your responsibilities as its owner.
