The late George White was founder of the Moab to Monument Valley Film Commission, the longest ongoing film commission in the world.

On display in the museum are production photographs, movie posters, autographed scripts, props from the many pictures filmed in the area, and displays about the western ranching heritage. 



What's the Buzz

The queen is inside of a plastic mesh tube. Worker bees cling to the tube trying to get in to attend to her. As Robin Straub lifts the new queen and her entourage out of the shipping box, I'm struck by how much it looks like a large pine cone. Robin places the queen with the tube open into the new hive box. Then she rather unceremoniously

unto the new nive box. dumps the three pounds of workers into the hive. She has prepared the hive box with sugar water and new frames. The sugar water tides the bees over until they can get out foraging for nectar (carbohydrates) and pollen (protein). Frames give the bees a structure on which to build their comb.

This was the installation of one of several hives being


started in Moab this spring. Jerry Shue, Moab's local bee expert and a former bee inspector from Pennsylvania, is on hand in case the bee keepers need help. Everything goes smoothly for Robin and her new bees. Several other prospective bee keepers are watching and learning about establishing a hive. Some will buy bees while others say they will wait for an older hive to divide and swarm.

Jerry has been a great resource for bee keepers in Moab Valley. Since he offered a workshop with the Youth

Garden Project, interest in bee keeping has been growing until now there are over 50 hives in the valley.

Later, Jerry and I are sitting in his backyard tasting honey from various sources with bees flying in and out of his hives. The honey is astonishingly varied in color and flavor. The dark wild honey from an old cottonwood tree in Mack, Colorado is mild where I had expected strong. The very light, lemon colored honey from urban Salt Lake is

floral, like eating a nasturtium blossom. A Moab honey is medium dark and strong flavored. When I taste the Kroger



honey from City Market, it is surprisingly bland. It is the difference between a great varietal wine and a cheap blend.

We have been sitting within a few feet of three hives, eating honey, and have not been bothered by the bees going about their work. Honey bees are just not aggressive, and if they should sting, they pay for it with their lives. A part

> of their abdomen comes off with the stinger. By immediately pulling out the stinger, you can minimize your reaction. Wasps, on the other hand, are more aggressive and don't die after stinging as bees do.

> Another important distinction between bees and wasps is that wasps build the large grey paper nests which hang from trees or buildings. These are sometimes mistaken for a swarm of bees. A bee swarm would appear black, rather than light grey, and be more irregular in shape than the wasp nest. Swarming bees are not dangerous

as they have no hive to defend, but bee keepers like to know about swarms because they can gather them and start another hive.

Wild bee hives in southeast Utah are frequently built in hollows in cliffs. The most beautiful construction I've seen was a wild hive in a crack and overhang of sandstone with the combs built outside the crack. They were milky white leaves of wax five to eight inches long and an inch or two thick in the middle. If you put your hands together in prayer, that is about the shape and size of each perfect comb.

> Bee keepers build a bee "town house" with the deeper, lower level or box for brood and the upper story for honey. The comb in the lower level is filled with eggs the queen has lain. All of the eggs are the same. They become workers, drones or queens depending on how they are fed by the female workers. The drones are the only males (making up 15% of the population). A queen mates with ten to twenty drones holding the

sperm in a sac to fertilize the eggs as she lays them. She will live for three to four years laying as many as 200,000 eggs a year.

Kyle and Carrie Bailey are also local bee stewards--a more accurate title than keepers according them. While Carrie says it is a lot of work, their enthusiasm and deep knowledge is obvious as they talk about bee life. The Baileys have gotten good production, harvesting 20 to 25 quarts of honey while leaving enough to get the bees through the winter. Since bees only fly when the temperature is between 58 and 80 degrees, and have to deal with wind, mites (introduced in the late 70's and early 80's), moths, viruses, and mice. I am amazed they ever have the energy to store extra honey.

According to Jerry, the interest for consumers in local honey is two-fold. First, people use it as an anti-allergen.

While there is no research establishing its benefit, there are plenty of anecdotal stories supporting its use. Another reason is the local foods movement which is about eating food that tastes better and is better for you while supporting those who produce it. The benefit of bees as pollinators is hard to overstate. When almond growers in the Sacramento Valley started importing bees to pollinate their trees, they increased production 1,000 fold.

To be part of buzz in Moab, just go to the Farmer's Market in mid-summer where there will be honey to taste and buy. If you want to keep bees, there is plenty of information on line, in *The Beekeeper's Handbook* by Sammataro and Avitabile, and, most importantly, from local "bee stewards".

HIKING HAPPENINGS

Slickrock Bike Trail - The Practice Loop

Don't let the name fool you-the Slickrock Bike Trail, which is in the Sand Flats Recreation Area, is a great place for hikers, too. And sharing this trail with experienced mountain bikers is like watching skilled performers on wheels as the riders twist and turn with stunning speed and grace over the Navajo Sandstone.



It's hard to imagine that once upon a time-150 to 190 million years ago, towards the end of the Triassic period-nothing but huge sand dunes covered the heart of the Sand Flats Recreation Area. Then a shallow sea invaded the region. When the waters departed, the shifting sands remained—eventually they solidified into the rolling slickrock hills that are a distinctive feature of this area.

Early settlers invented the word "slickrock" because their metal shod horses found the barren rock slick to walk on. It's just the opposite for hikers and bikers-the sandpaper coarseness provides excellent traction except when it is wet. Then it does get slick!



Former Moab resident Dick Wilson, sometimes referred to as "Mr. Slickrock," formulated the idea of creating a motorcycle trail in Sand Flats. The Bureau Of Land Management (BLM) approved it in May 1969. Then Wilson marked the route, including the practice loop and several spur routes, while naming some of the unique features, such as Abyss Viewpoint, Shrimp Rock and Updraft Arch. The BLM painted the trail with broken white lines and dedicated it on July 22, 1969. Over the years some alterations have been made, but the biggest change occurred in the 1980's when mountain bikers adopted it.



turn left at Dave's Corner Market on to Mill Creek Drive. At the three-way stop, go straight on the Sand Flats Road up the steep, winding road to the entrance booth. The paved parking area for the Slickrock Bike Trail

is on the left a short distance after that.

The big difference between the Slickrock Bike Trail and the Practice Loop is the length. The entirety of the Practice Loop is 1.7 miles—from start to finish the total mileage for this hike is 2.3 miles versus 10.5 miles on the main trail.

By following the white lines that start at the east end of the parking lot, you won't get lost. In 3/10ths of a mile, at a distinct crest, it is clearly marked to take a right for the Practice Loop.

At the beginning of my walk, I pause and turn full circle for a long look at the familiar geography of my home turfthe Bookcliffs, Moab Rim, Behind The

Rocks, Porcupine Rim, the La Sal Mountains-and The Great Wall, a massive rock structure in Arches National Park. Further along, I occasionally catch a glimpse of the winding gap of Negro Bill Canyon, and at one particular high point I can even peek down its lengthy corridor all the way to the Colorado River!

After the chilliness of April, the wildflowers-cliffrose, wallflower, sand verbena and evening primroseare finally responding to the wake up call of a late spring. The creamy-white, uniquely designed petals of the evening primrose are pollinated by nocturnal insects, so it makes sense that those blossoms open up to them during the coolness of early evening and close during the heat of the day.

Each half-mile on the Practice

Loop is marked with a blue dot. A short distance after the first half-mile marker, I choose the option to take the side trail for the view at Echo Point. On this short trail, it doesn't take long before the white lines turn to yellow with the warning: "Foot Trail." A little further, a mass of yellow dots marks the obvious end of the trail.

And what a view it is on this warm, seductive day in early May. Looking down on the lush bottom of Echo Canyon, a side canyon of Negro Bill-the swirling layers





up to 200 mph.

After a long refreshing break, I'm back on the Practice Loop, and the next blue dot marker indicates that I've covered the distance of one mile. After that, several sand pits, which drag at my feet, bring most mountain bikes

> to a frustrating halt! The last 1.5 mile blue dot comes up just before returning to the main trail, where it is clearly marked on the slickrock-left to return to the parking lot, or right to continue further on.

> A quick ten-minute drive out of town makes this highly accessible, year round treasure ideal for short, spontaneous outings. It is most crowded in the spring, but it's also popular in the fall when weather conditions are

usually at their optimum. What a difference the solitude of winter makes, when the trail often disappears under a bed of snow-a tremendous contrast to the other extreme, when summer temperatures often rise above the century mark. Then it's a recipe for a blazing workout in a land of minimal shade where the heat radiates off the slickrock walls like a convection oven. At that time of year start very early (the crack of dawn) or very late in the afternoon and be sure to carry a huge supply of water!!


Bordered by two wilderness study areas-Negro Bill to the north, Mill Creek to the south-this unique playground receives almost 100,000 visitors a year. In response to an overload of outdoor recreationists, the Moab community, Americorps, Grand County and the BLM collaborated in 1995 to preserve this spectacular resource-an unusual partnership then formed between the county and the BLM so they could manage, protect, maintain and rehabilitate the 7,320 acres within its boundaries.

To get there from Main Street, turn east at the Moab Information Center on to Center Street and follow it to the stop sign on 400 East. Then go right, drive five blocks and

How To Get A Drink...

...In Moab, Utah

Recent changes to Utah Liquor Laws have made it less confusing and easier to get an alcoholic drink. You can now go to **some** restaurants and without ordering food, you can order a drink.

Some restrictions may still apply as to where you can sit in a particular establishment when consuming alcohol. For example, Zax has an adult atmosphere

in the Watering Hole where you can order a cocktail and watch your favorite sporting event on their 13 tvs, with or without ordering food. This locally owned full-

service restaurant serves their entire menu in both the Watering Hole and restaurant. However, if you sit in the family dining restaurant, you need to order food to consume an alcoholic beverage.



The Moab Brewery, Moab's only on-site microbrewery, offers a variety of locally brewed beers in their tavern, as well as being available at other restaurants in town. Many flavors are on sale at retail stores in Moab as well in the Salt Lake City area.

Eddie McStiff's Restaurant, Brew Pub and Bar has 12 beers on tap and a tiki bar where you can get a glass of wine or a cocktail or beer without ordering food.

The Rio Sports Bar & Grill boasts Moab's largest selection of liquor with indoor and outdoor seating (must be 21 years or older).


Also new is the addition of two upscale lounges in Moab. Vista Lounge located inside Buck's Grill House and The Ghost Bar, upstairs at Jeffrey's Steakhouse. Both locations have a sophisticated and casual atmosphere to relax and wait for dinner or to just stop in at the end of the day and have a drink to unwind.

Moab has two local wineries. Castle Creek Winery is located at Red Cliffs Lodge, 15 miles from Moab on Scenic Highway 128 (The River Road). Spanish Valley Vineyards is located just off Highway 191, south of Moab about 6 miles on Zimmerman Lane. Both wineries have on-site tasting rooms and wine available for sale. Utah State Liquor Stores also sell many local wines. If you would like to try some of these award winning vintages, look for restaurants serving these Moab wines.

The Utah State Liquor Store is the only location where you can purchase bottled liquor, wine and beer with an alcoholic content above 3.2%. The Moab store is

located at 55 West 200 South and is open from Monday through Saturday (11:00 am to 9:00 pm - May 1st to November 1st and from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m - November 1st to May 1st). They are closed on Sundays and Holidays. Beer (3.2%

Utah law forbids open containers in or about any motor vehicle. A blood alcohol level of 0.08% (0.05% if you have a child in the car with you) is the maximum allowable under Utah Code to be declared "driving under the influence."







STUNTS, STARS & LEGENDS

Ben Johnson

Born in Foraker, Oklahoma on the Osage Indian Reservation of Cherokee and Irish ancestry to Ben, Sr. and Ollie Susan Johnson. Ben's father was a rancher and a rodeo champion. He traveled with his father on the rodeo circuit and became a star in rodeo prior to getting involved with films.

Ben was a professional Rodeo Cowboy Team Roping World Champion in 1953. He was inducted into the professional Rodeo Cowboys Association's Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame in 1973.

Johnson was married to Carol Elaine Jones in 1941 and it lasted 53 years until her death in 1994. They had no children. Carol was the daughter of noted Hollywood horse wrangler "Fats" Jones.



Ben began in pictures when Howard Hughes filmed "The Outlaw" and bought some horses at the Oklahoma ranch that Johnson's father managed and hired Ben to take the horses to northern Arizona for the Outlaw's shooting and then took them to Hollywood.

Director John Ford in 1948 hired Ben for stunt work in "Fort Apache", as a riding double for Henry Fonda. While filming the horses pulling a wagon with three men in it stampeded, Johnson, who "happened to be setting his horse" stopped the runaway wagon and saved the men.

His first credited roll was in Ford's "3 Godfathers". Ford suggested him for a starring role in the 1949 movie "Mighty Joe Young", opposite Terry Moore. He was also in the John Wayne classic western "She Wore A Yellow Ribbon" (1949), and "Rio Grande" (1950) which was filmed in Moab. It was Ben and Harry Carey, Jr. who did the `Roman riding' sequence during the race around the track out near the Colorado river. Roman riding is when a rider stands atop two horses (one foot on each) and the horses run at full gallop. Both roles showcased Johnson's riding skills. Ben was also cast as the lead in "Wagon Master" (1950) alongside Harry Carey, Jr. and Ward Bond of "Wagon Train" fame on television. Wagon Master was also filmed in Moab. Many of the local Moabites appeared in both films as extras or wranglers.

Johnson played a supporting role in "Shane" (1953) starring Alan Ladd. He did his own stunt fighting with Ladd's stunt double Russ Saunders. In 1964 Ben appeared in another Ford classic, "Cheyenne Autumn", many scenes were filmed in and around Moab.

Ben Johnson was foot printed in cement at the Hollywood Stuntmen's Hall of Fame when it was located in Palmdale, California in 1975, along with many of the stunt legends and stars like Burt Reynolds, Lee Majors, Dale Robertson and Yvonne de Carlo ... stunt legends being Yakima Canutt, Richard Talmadge, David Sharpe, Hal Needham, Ronnie Rondell, and many others.

Ben won an Academy Award for his performance in the Peter Bagdonavich movie, "The Last Picture Show" in 1971.

The Hollywood Stuntmen's Hall of Fame was located in Moab, Utah from 1989 until 1996 in the old Mormon Church on 1st Street, just off Main Street. There, many



stars and stunt people came to be honored and to visit the thousands of pieces of memorabilia.

The Hall of Fame is presently without a home and is interested in anyone who would like more information on how they can help in this endeavor to reopen its doors to the visiting public. Look of Landmark Bridge to Change Again

A pack trail well-used over the years beneath Courthouse Wash Bridge is targeted for improvements within the year to attract mountain-bikers and other trail users to an ever-expanding spider-webbing system intended to support and encourage safer foot and bicycle traffic along major travel routes to scenic areas around Moab.

The trail that follows the tributary creek feeding into the Colorado River north of Moab is envisioned as a link to a larger trail system that is intended eventually to branch off near the valley entrance and offer options of following the Potash Road downriver or heading north to state Highway 313 and Dead Horse Point.

Alternatively, users beginning at Courthouse Wash can fork left after passing under the bridge and walk or bicycle along another planned path leading to the bike bridge spanning the Colorado River and follow a new path that would branch off and shoulder Highway 191 to 500 West at the north end the city -- or choose a unique route paralleling the river road, Highway 128, as far as Negro Bill Canyon.

The proposed trail link, which borders Arches National Park on the north side of Highway 191, is "now known as the Courthouse Connector," said Lee Shenton, a county employee assigned to land-use issues involving the old Atlas uranium mill tailings cleanup site.

It's a trail system requiring millions and millions of dollars and years to develop at a comparatively small cost to local residents, said Dave Olsen, Moab City planner.

"Grand County is doing really well for just a minute amount of money that we're putting in," Olsen said.

Among agencies involved have been the U.S. Department of Energy, the Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, Utah Department of Transportation, Moab city, Grand County, and private landowners. The segment proposed for the Potash Road, Highway 279, also required U.S. Department of Justice authorization for use of property adjacent to the mill tailings pile that was purchased from a private owner by the Grand Canyon Trust and deeded to the DOE for the purpose of developing the trail.

The land fell under the category of "restricted" when deeded over by the private nonprofit trust to the federal government, because it was within the vicinity of DOE's hazardous UMTRA (mill tailings removal project) site, and the "nature of the property" had to match the "nature of the mill site," said Shenton, county liaison to the DOE and UMTRA. Therefore, the U.S. Justice had to be petitioned by all the agencies supporting the plan for use of the land to develop a recreational trail. All those involved did their part, writing letters and making calls, and approval came in February.


Olsen said the section involving DOE lands is referred to under the working title of "Mill Site Riverside Trail."

In the process of developing the bike-and-pedestrian system, the landmark bridge spanning Courthouse Wash will again be replaced -- this time to widen the two-lane state road to four lanes. It is the first bridge encountered as motorists enter the Moab Valley.

UDOT replacement of the bridge is phase one of the project, and bids will be going out this year for that phase,

A sketch of the old bridge (circa 1960) by Dwain C. Barker. Courtesy of the Barker Family Estate.


Olsen said. Shenton said it should be completed at the latest by next spring.

The original bridge -- a steel truss structure measuring 16-by-101 feet -- served those accessing Moab from 1916 until it was replaced in 1934 by a wider concrete bridge, according to "A History of Grand County" (Utah Centennial series, 1996). Historian Ed Firmage noted in the book that the state approved a \$1.6 million bid to reconstruct the bridge at Courthouse Wash in 1991.

Shenton said officials representing the various agencies involved in the Courthouse Connector trail proposal walked the route on a beautiful day and agreed it is a naturally gorgeous place to put a trail and develop a park-like setting near the bridge.

"We all recognized the trail is going to be attractive to Mom and Pop and the kids, and Grandma and Grandpa, because of the great setting and really easy ride," he said. "This is not hard-core for mountain-bikers; it is a community recreation trail...a rolling trail with no ups and downs. Really good quality."

Shenton said the trek with other officials that day was so inspirational he decided, "I'm going to have to get a mountain bike." And he did. From his wife, on Father's Day.

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


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MOUNTAIN BIKING

Rules of the Road—Tips for Cyclists and Motorists (abbreviated list; see website for complete list)


Tips for cyclists

- When not impeding traffic, ride no more than two abreast. When a car is coming or when you are riding in traffic, ride single file.
- Obey all traffic signs, signals, and lane markings. If you want the respect of motorists, you must show respect for traffic laws.
- Ride predictably.
- Ride with the flow of traffic.
- Ride on the right side of the roadway or bike lane as far to the right side as safely possible.
- It is acceptable to ride in the middle of the lane if you are making a left turn, if there are obstacles impeding the bike lane or if you are moving at the same speed as traffic.
- Don't weave between parked cars or cars stopped at red lights.
- Wear bright clothing that increases your visibility to motorists.
- When riding at dusk or dark, use reflective clothing and lights.
- Always wear a helmet. Your helmet should sit level on your head and the straps should be snug.
- Make eye contact with motorists when making a turn, so each party is aware of one another.
- When entering or crossing a road from a parking lot, driveway or crosswalk, yield to vehicles already on the road.
- Signal when turning.
- Be respectful of other road users. Courtesy is contagious.



Tips for motorists

- Give at least three feet of space when passing a bicyclist. If traveling on higher-speed roads, give more space.
- Watch for bicycles in traffic; they are smaller and harder to see.
- Don't underestimate the speed of a bicyclist. Many bicyclists can easily travel at 25-30 mph.
- Slow down around cyclists.
- When driving near a child on a bike, be prepared for the unexpected.
- When turning left, yield to any vehicle, including a bicycle approaching from the opposite direction.
- When turning right and passing a cyclist, leave plenty of room between cyclists who are also turning right.
- Be patient when driving around cyclists. Roadway conditions may make it necessary for cyclists to ride in the middle of the lane because of potholes, road debris, or a parked vehicle.
- Be aware of your surroundings and don't drive distracted.
- Be aware of bicyclists entering the roadway from




- driveways, intersection sidewalks and other streets.
- Avoid honking your horn around cyclists, if possible. Car horns are much louder outside of your vehicle and can startle bicyclists and cause dangerous reactions.
- Be respectful of other road users. Courtesy is contagious.



TRAIL HAPPENINGS

Equestrian Trails at Onion Creek and Ken's Lake

Two longtime favorite horse trails in the Moab area have been designated and marked for equestrian use. The Red Rock Trail near Ken's Lake and the Onion Creek trail system have designated campsites and corrals and are clearly signed.



Onion Creek Trails and Equestrian Campsites

The riding is wonderful! The scenery is spectacular and many old John Wayne westerns were filmed at Onion Creek. Riding the terrain puts one into the mood of a pioneer or cowboy in that time and place. The footing is wonderful for horses, barefoot or shoed. There are some long straight stretches for extending into faster gaits, as well as some more technical spots that get the horses to think. Besides the two clearly marked bi-directional loop trails, many other unmarked trails beg for exploration on horseback. One can easily spend a few days horse camping and riding various trails in the area.

The camping facilities at Onion Creek have been fixed up to feel like an old western movie. There are 2 developed camping sites with picnic tables. Pit toilets are nearby. For the horses there are four cedar corrals, each about 20' x 20'. It is a good idea for campers to bring extra water for their horses. Horses can drink out of nearby Onion Creek, but it is somewhat salty.

Down the road at the Red Cliffs Lodge is a museum featuring history of movie making in the area. The museum has a self-guided tour and is open to the public daily. The



on site winery has daily tours and wine tasting at the lodge.

Directions to Onion Creek: Drive east along the Colorado River (Highway 128, "the river road") for 20 miles. Turn right at the Onion Creek road sign. The camping area and turnaround are about a mile drive from 128. It is secluded, quiet and a safe place for horses

overnight. Reservations can be made by calling BLM in Moab at 435-259-2100 weekdays. The fee is \$5.00 per night per vehicle. All trash and manure must be hauled away.

Red Rock Trail and Equestrian Campsites at Ken's Lake

The Red Rock Trail is another fun, scenic, and interesting ride. It's hard to



believe that such wonderful riding exists so close to Moab. The trail weaves along the red cliffs to the north and south of the campground and connects up to several other trails that wander to the Faux Falls viewpoint and around the lake. For those who want to explore, one can ride further -either north or south for more adventure



and challenges. The trail is mostly sand with a bit of slickrock, which provides very good footing for barefoot horses. A few hills, creek crossings, and activity of other campers offer some minor challenges, but nothing extreme.

Two new equestrian campsites are almost completed at the Ken's Lake Recreational Area Campground. Each

site has a level spot for a trailer, a picnic table and a fire pit. There will be two 20' x 20' pipe fence corrals. Pit toilets are nearby. No potable water is provided so be sure to bring your own, however good water for horses is available in the stream, or lake. To pick up the trail from the campsite, a rider can go along the camp road to the

stream area, overland towards the Falls, or across the street to the parking lot which also provides access to the trail. The fee for a nightly stay is \$12.00, and it is first come first served. Trash and horse manure can be put in the dumpster located in the campground. Dogs must be on a leash at all

times within the camp area.

For non-riding members of your camping party, Ken's Lake offers hiking, fishing, swimming, or hanging out on the beach. It is also a great place for a dip after a dusty ride.

Directions to Ken's Lake: Drive 7.8 miles south of Moab from

Center street on Highway 191 and turn left or east at the sign to the La Sal Mountain Loop Road. Drive .6 miles on county rd/old airport rd to a stop sign then turn right, or south, on Spanish Valley Drive. Drive 1.5 additional miles and turn left, or east at the sign to Ken's Lake, (county rd 175). The lake and campground are on the left. Enjoy your ride and your camp!

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

DAYLENGTH

The Earth's orbit is an ellipse with

the sun closer to one end. At the Summer Solstice, the Earth's speed slows as it reaches the point in its orbit that is farthest from the sun. The result is very little change in the times of sunrise and sunset around the solstice. Three stages of twilight mark the transition from day to night. Civil twilight, which allows movement without artificial light, continues approximately onehalf hour after sunset. Nautical twilight, which reveals shapes but not detail, lasts another half hour after sunset. Astronomical twilight, a faint glow above the horizon, is lengthened near the Summer Solstice. In June light lingers on the horizon nearly two hours after sunset. The reverse progression applies to dawn. (The time of sunrise and sunset assumes a flat horizon. Actual time may vary depending upon the landscape.)

The brightest evening stars mark the Summer Triangle in the eastern sky-Vega (Lyra), Deneb (Cygnus), and Altair (Aquila). Bright stars overhead are Arcturus (Bootes), Spica (Virgo), and Regulus (Leo). Ν

> early in June, meteors from the region of Hercules and Scorpius provide an opportunity to begin viewing between 10:00pm and midnight, continuing on until 3:00am. Around 3:00am on June 7 is a good time to look for fireballs originating from the region of Aries overhead. Around the same time look northward towards Perseus and southward towards Libra for more activity. During the middle of the month, a full moon obscures all but the brightest meteors, but some will be strong enough to be seen by the most determined meteor gazers. On the last night of June, as astronomical twilight fades, gaze northeastward towards Draco. Look for meteor activity in this region as Draco rises overhead around midnight.

> Note: Hold your hand at arm's length to measure apparent distances in the sky. The width of the little finger approximates 1.5 degrees. Middle, ring, and little finger touching represent about 5 degrees. The width of a fist is about 10 degrees. The fist with the thumb extended at a right angle equals 15 degrees. The hand stretched from thumb to little finger approximates 20-25 degrees. The diameter of both the full moon and the sun spans only 0.5 degree. Adjust for the size of your hand.

VISIBLE PLANETS

Jupiter - Even though Jupiter, Mars, and Venus appear in the early morning sky, only Jupiter is likely to be seen because all are very low on the horizon. Jupiter, first of the planets to rise, appears in the east as twilight brightens the morning sky. If viewing from a high vantage point, you may see it rise above the mountains or rim before sunlight claims the day. Jupiter rises (in Pisces) earlier each morning so it will be higher in the sky by the end of the month and easier to see before sunrise. On June 26 it appears about five degrees below the waning crescent moon. (Magnitude -2.3)

Mars - Use the distance scale below to locate Mars, a dim red orb, about fifteen degrees below Jupiter. After midmonth, Mars rises about one and one-half hours before sunrise (with the morning twilight) which may allow it to clear the surrounding landscape before twilight gives way to daylight. It rises with Aries, which will be too faint to see. (Magnitude +1.3)

Mercury - During the last week of the month, Mercury becomes visible in the evening sky about 45 minutes after sunset. Find a high vantage point to view it. If twin stars, Castor and Pollux, of Gemini, are visible in the northwestern sky, then you should be able to find Mercury. Trace a line downward from Castor (upper star) through Pollux and on to Mercury, which will be smaller but brighter than the twin stars. On June 28 it will be about five degrees south of Pollux in the constellation Taurus. (Magnitude -1.5 to -0.5) Saturn - The only planet in the evening sky is Saturn, except for the brief window of opportunity to view Mercury at month's end. Saturn's steady golden light appears to the upper right of Spica in the constellation Virgo. June 9-11 the planet moves to within one-quarter degree below the star Porrima (in Virgo's center). Saturn then begins to drift eastward again across Virgo. On June 9/10 look for Saturn about 8 degrees north of the waxing gibbous moon. (Magnitude +0.5)

Hold the star chart high above Cassiopeia your head and match the compass MAJOR CONSTELLATIONS directions to the direction you are facing. Adjust the star chart by orienting Ursa amelopa Major (Big Dipper) to match its position in the sky. W E 181 The star chart approximates the sky from astronomical twilight to midnight. As the night and month progresses, the constellations shift toward the northwest. The celestial equator is measured in hours (h). The ecliptic is measured in purus degrees. Cen S

- June 23 Last Quarter Moon rises soon after midnight.

(The time of moonrise and moonset assumes a flat horizon. Actual time may vary.)

SUMMER SOLSTICE

Once a year the tilt of the Earth's axis presents the northern hemisphere's face directly towards the sun. When this occurs the sun's location in the sky reaches its northernmost point. This year that point-the Summer Solstice—occurs June 21 at 11:16am. At that time the sun will be directly overhead at 23.44 degrees North latitude (tip of Baha). That is still about 15 degrees south of our latitude. If skies were to darken at 11:16am we would see that the sun is in the constellation Taurus. It's about the same position in the sky as the 0 magnitude star Arcturus (Bootes), which is overhead in our evening sky. Once the solstice point passes, the position of the sun in the daytime sky begins to move southward.

METEOR EVENTS

No major meteor showers occur in June, but the night sky is ablaze with overlapping minor meteor events. The most active period is when the radiant constellation is directly overhead. That's usually about 3:00am. However,

Venus - The brightest of planets is the last of the three morning planets to rise—less than an hour before the sun. It will be too low on our horizon to be easily seen. (Magnitude -3.9)

Apparent magnitude values range from Note: -4 to +6 for most planets and visible stars. The lower the value the brighter the object. A decrease of 1.0 magnitude is 2.5 times brighter.

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NATURE HAPPENINGS

Shake, Rattle and Slither

Snakes are the Rodney Dangerfields of the reptilian world – they "don't get no respect." Just listen for the "oohs" and "aahs" when a western collard lizard is sighted



along the trail versus the shrieks heard when a rattlesnake is seen.

Snakes and lizards are ectotherms, meaning they are cold-blooded and regulate their body temperature by absorbing heat from their surroundings. Many reptiles are active for only four or five months during the year; The remaining months are spent underground in hibernation areas called "hibernaculums," which is Latin for "a tent for winter quarters."

Several common Canyon Country species of snakes include garter snakes, gopher snakes, whipsnakes and rattlesnakes. Of the four, garter snakes are found more often in riparian or wetland areas. Though common, these snakes either quickly disappear into streamside vegetation or escape via the water swimming away like some sea serpent.

Whipsnakes which are found in riparian areas or drier upland areas, are often overlooked because they are treeclimbers and blend in well with a tree limb or branch. Rail thin, these snakes are well-named.



Gopher snakes, also known as bull snakes, are nonvenomous snakes that may reach up to six feet long. Their yellow to cream-colored bodies bear dark spots on their



bodies bear dark spots on their backs, and the head is ovalshaped. When threatened, gopher snakes may coil up, vibrate their tail and hiss like a rattlesnake. They rely on the rattlesnake's reputation to precede them and the gopher snakes utilize this mimicry to avoid trouble.

Ground predators like rattlesnakes, gopher snakes are also excellent climbers. I've observed these colorful snakes in cottonwood trees feeding on nestling robins, as well as

traversing along canyon walls heading towards the nests of young cliff swallows.

Non-venomous snakes aside, rattlesnake top the list of snakes that don't get any respect.



The midget faded rattlesnake is the common "buzzworm" of the Canyonlands Region. The genus Crotalus is represented by several subspecies, and means "rattle tail." Cryptic in coloration, the midget faded is relatively short, about 2 feet in length. This pit viper has a triangular-shaped head, brownish spots outlined in black on the back and a small rattle or "resonator" at the tip of the tail. When vibrated the rattle produces an internationally recognized buzz that serves as a warning notice.

Rattlesnakes are mostly ambush predators and inject a neurotoxin into their prey through large hollow fangs. Unable to escape, the prey is consumed whole. These snakes sense through infrared heat-sensing receptors located in pits between their eyes and mouth known as loreal pits. These sensors provide the rattlesnake with a thermal image, allowing the snakes to hunt at night. The snakes also use their

forked tongues to "smell" the air. When the tongue is stuck out it

samples the air and ground. A very sensitive chemical receptor known as the Jacobson's organ, located in the roof of the mouth, analyses this chemical sample and produces a signature of the snake's surroundings. Named for a Danish surgeon, Ludwig Levin Jacobson, this organ is common to many vertebrates but well developed in snakes.

For all their negative publicity and history, snakes play an important role in the natural world as predator and prey. Although they may never make it off of the Dangerfield list, they should be respected for their amazing adaptations for living in the desert environment.





meal, cowboys would sing songs around the campfire to pass the time and calm the cattle for the night. The







MOAB AREA ROCK ART

The Moab area has numerous examples of Indian rock art to enjoy. This article briefly discusses some types, dates, the artists and their cultures and how to take care of these irreplacable sites.

WHAT IS INDIAN ROCK ART?


There are two types of rock art: petroglyphs (motifs that are pecked, ground, incised, abraded, or scratched on the rock surface) and pictographs (paintings or drawings in one or more colors using mineral pigments and plant dyes on the rock surface). Although many images may have originally been executed as a combination of both techniques, most now appear only as a petroglyph because the paint material has faded or washed away over many years.

THE PEOPLE

Rock art was produced by a number of prehistoric and historic peoples over thousands of years. Their histories in the area are very complex. A big game hunting people, known as Paleo-Indians, are considered to be the first human users in the area. Their game included now-extinct Pleistocene fauna such as mammoths and mastodons. A later culture called Archaic, probably used central based camps during their seasonal round of activities based on harvesting wild plants and animals. They did not build permanent habitation structures, but lived in caves and in small brush shelters built in the open.

The Anasazi whose culture centered south of Moab in the Four Corners area, concentrated much of their subsistence efforts on the cultivation of corn, beans and squash. These sedentary people, also harvested a wide variety of wild resources, such as pinion nuts, grasses, bighorn sheep and deer. The Fremont were contemporary with the Anasazi people, also grew corn, and were apparently more dependent on hunting and gathering wild resources than were the Anasazi. Their territory was mainly north of the Colorado River, but overlapped the Anasazi at Moab.


The most recent inhabitants, the Utes have been in southeast Utah since the 1200's, They were a very mobile hunting and gathering people who moved in from the Great Basin. They used the bow and arrow, made baskets and brownware -pottery, and lived in brush wickiups and tipis. The No-tah (Ute people) lived freely throughout western Colorado and eastern Utah until about 1880.



SITES

If you have trouble locating rock art once you are near a site, don't be discouraged. You will develop a sense of which types of rocks and surfaces are appropriate areas to look for petroglyphs and pictographs. Petroglyphs are commonly found on the black or brown surface (called desert varnish) of rock cliffs. The straight, smooth, red sandstone found in the Navajo and Wingate formations is a good area to look for -pictographs. As you spot one image, look carefully around the adjoining surface areas. Often there are numerous images at any given site. The main panel might have one or more subpanels nearby. Some of the images may be very faint, having faded or eroded through the years.







Dog Days Of Summer – A Survival Guide For Your Pooch

Warm summer days offer more time for you to spend outside with you dog. While bright sun and hot temperatures of summer may be nice for a day outside for us, they can be dangerous for dogs.



All dogs are susceptible to heat stroke but dark colored dogs, overweight dogs, older or frail dogs, and brachycephalic dogs (those cute dogs with smashed in noses) are at higher risk than others. Dogs, especially light colored ones, are also susceptible to sunburn. The good news is that these threats to your pooch are preventable.

Protecting Your Dog from Heat Stroke and Exhaustion

Leaving a dog in a parked car during summer weather is the leading cause of heat stroke and too often causes death. Dogs can also suffer heat exhaustion or heat stroke if they exercise too heavily on a hot, humid day or, if they live outdoors and don't have shelter from the sun. Older dogs are less tolerant of heat and may succumb to heat strokes more readily than younger dogs.

Limit the time you spend in the direct, midday sun with your dog. Don't keep them in the backyard without shade and plenty of water to drink. You can even help keep your dog cool in the summer months by keeping a kid sized pool in a shaded area for your dog to splash around in.

Never leave your dog unattended in your car or truck. The heat inside a vehicle, even one in the shade, can climb very quickly. At times, the heat in your car can go up to double what it is outside. You may think you can help them keep cool by leaving a window open, but that really doesn't offer much help. Take them with you when you leave your vehicle. If you can't, do your dog a favor and leave him or her home.

If you leave your pet in your home each day when you go to work, help keep your dog cool in the summer months by leaving the air-conditioning running all day. You don't need to leave it on high, but leave it running on the lowest setting so they have some relief from the climbing temperatures.

If your dog has become overheated you will know it by how they act. Heat exhaustion comes first with the symptoms of excessive panting and flushed skin (easiest to recognize in the ears and mucous membranes) or dog is hot to the touch. Without treatment, heat exhaustion will escalate. Look for symptoms like a body temperature of over 104⁰ F, increased heart rate and breathing, salivation, vomiting and/or diarrhea, weakness or dizziness, stumbling, depression or subdued behavior, seizures and loss of consciousness.

If your dog is showing signs of heat exhaustion/ heat stroke, **take action immediately by calling your veterinarian.** Do not wait it out because even if they seem to have improved, there's a chance that internal damage has been done if their fever was over 104^o F and they may experience organ failure, heart and respiratory problems, seizures, or death. okay to apply sun-block to your dog's nose and the exposed skin on the ears. It is okay if the dog licks the sun-block, because most are not toxic, BUT, you should always avoid sun-blocks that contain zinc or PABA. If you notice that any portion of your dog's skin is reddened or blistered, contact your veterinarian right away.

Walking Your Dog in the Hot Weather

When you walk your dog in the summer months, remember the pads on their feet are sensitive. You can help keep them cool by watching where they are walking. Sidewalks and road surfaces are extremely hot when they are receiving direct sunshine. Help your dog keep cool by walking them on grassy surfaces when the sun is at its hottest. If you do take your dog hiking or cycling long distances consider outfitting them with shoes or conditioning their paws with a non-Shea butter base paw balm (Shea butter softens the pads but does not condition them).

Water, Water, Water

Be extra diligent about having fresh, cool water on hand for your pet. Keep their bowls at home full, and don't forget to leave them a pool in the backyard if they must hang out there for any amount of time. If you are walking with your dog, or spending the day at the park, be sure to have plenty of water with you to help keep your dog hydrated.

Final Thoughts

Keeping your dog cool and healthy in the summer months is not that hard as long as you give it a little thought. Keep exposure to the midday sun to a minimum, offer plenty of water and shade, and keep exercise to a minimum.

Protecting Your Dog from Sunburn
